



EDUCATE ENGAGE EXPLORE

Lyric Unlimited, established in 2012, is an ongoing initiative and a department of Lyric Opera of Chicago that administers education and community engagement programs and new artistic initiatives. General director Anthony Freud's vision is for Lyric Unlimited to help redefine the function of Lyric Opera of Chicago in the community it serves and steward the art of opera through the next century. The mandate is for the company to take a larger role in the civic identity of Chicago by engaging a broader, more representative audience, including people and communities for whom opera has traditionally had little or no relevance or place.

In the 2014/15 season Lyric Unlimited addressed this directive through three broad, interrelated efforts:

- Continuing to develop and refine Lyric Unlimited's education programs, involving almost 13,000 Chicago public school students and more than 42,000 students total.
- Engaging with new individuals and communities through collaborations with over two dozen different cultural organizations, many with no previous association with opera.
- Exploring what opera can be and whom it is for through the commissioning and premiering of three new works, each taking the art form in a new direction.

As a result, more than 126,000 people have learned about, experienced, and perhaps drawn new conclusions about the resonance and relevance of opera through Lyric Unlimited activities.



The fall 2014 tour of Opera in the Neighborhoods broke with a longstanding tradition of presenting adaptations of standard operas and instead featured an original opera composed specifically for children. The Brothers Grimm by Dean Burry delighted more than 17,000 primary students and their teachers.

Lyric Unlimited also produced a Brothers Grimm study guide for students and teachers and held a professional development workshop to help teachers prepare their classes for the performances.

For the second year in a row, secondary teachers were offered a wider range of choices from Lyric's mainstage productions in Lyric Unlimited's Performances for Students program. More than 6,500 secondary students came to the Civic Opera House to experience one of seven different mainstage operas.

Lyric Unlimited produced study guides and held teacher professional development workshops for Carousel and The Passenger.

Backstage Tours complement all of Lyric Unlimited's education programs and also serve as a stand-alone introduction to opera. The popular field trip attracted more than 3,000 participants, and advances in guide training and evaluation further improved an already high-quality educational experience.

Elementary residencies focused on
creating and performing an original
opera; secondary residencies
centered on in-depth study of a
Lyric mainstage opera. In all, more
than 1,000 students received
intensive opera education.















Caminos a la ópera (Pathways to Opera) is Lyric Unlimited's Latino audience development initiative which expands Lyric's commitment to Chicago's Latino community through partnership, engagement, and collaboration. Through Caminos, Lyric Unlimited creates and presents new and culturally relevant works, hosts events with partner organizations in community venues, and fosters enduring relationships with Latino audiences.

The centerpiece for 2014/15 was the commission and premiere of a new mariachi opera: El Pasado Nunca Se Termina (The Past Is Never Finished), with music by José "Pepe" Martínez and libretto by Leonard Foglia. The five preview performances at community venues and two world premiere performances at the Civic Opera House attracted a total audience of nearly 9,000.

Coming on the heels of the world's first mariachi opera (*Cruzar la Cara de la Luna*, presented by Lyric Unlimited in 2013), the success of *El Pasado* proves the vitality of a new genre.

A key to the success of Caminos a la ópera is its partnerships with leading Latino cultural organizations and the creation of collaboratively-developed events, including performances by cast members, community receptions, mariachi lecture/demonstrations, workshops, student performances, and even a mariachi jam session. These events drew an additional audience of 1,100.

Lyric Unlimited continues to provide access to opera and opera education to its loyal patrons, new audiences, and those who are simply curious—in and out of the Civic Opera House.

More than 8,500 college and graduate students saw Lyric performances at a steep discount through the NEXT ticket program.

The annual Stars of Lyric Opera at Millennium Park concert gave an estimated 16,000 Chicagoans access to world-class opera music for free, while low-income Chicago seniors received free tickets to the annual Senior Matinee.

Lyric's renowned chorus was featured in a pair of concerts entitled A Wondrous Sound: The Lyric Opera Chorus Celebrates a New Season, attended by more than 1,500.

Three Lyric Uncorked sessions offered more than 100 opera newcomers an informal social setting to interact with and learn from a range of opera professionals.

And Pre-Opera Talks enriched the opera experience for more than 37,000 Lyric patrons.
