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From the General Director and the Chairman

Welcome to Lyric, and to an extraordinary adventure in our exploration of iconic works from the world of Broadway.

Up to now in our "Broadway at Lyric" series, we've concentrated on American classics. This season, however, for the first time we're producing a work that didn't originate in this country. It's also our first production of a rock opera – in fact, a work that was central to the whole *idea* of rock opera: Andrew Lloyd Webber and Tim Rice's *Jesus Christ Superstar*.

Audiences everywhere have embraced this piece for so many reasons. There is, first of all, the overwhelming drama with which Lloyd Webber and Rice depict the last days of Christ. There are the powerful characterizations of the central figures – Jesus, Judas, and Mary. Above all, there is the stupendous score that offers one memorable musical number after another, from the exhilarating "What's the Buzz?" to the touching "I Don't Know How to Love Him," the hair-raising "Gethsemane," and, of course, the stirring title song. The show is filled with an innovative and very exciting mix of musical styles, drawing on rock, gospel, folk, and funk themes. With the combination of orchestra and rock band, not to mention dazzlingly high-energy dance, the piece's cumulative impact is electrifying.

We're thrilled that Lyric will be presenting the American premiere of one of the most triumphantly successful stagings that *Jesus Christ Superstar* has ever had. The production by director Timothy Sheader, artistic director of Regent's Park Open Air Theatre in London, premiered there in 2016. It was received with enormous acclaim by critics and audiences alike, and its triumph was confirmed with the hugely prestigious Olivier Award for Best Musical Revival. By popular demand it was remounted at Regent's Park the following summer, with audiences again responding to it with immense enthusiasm.

The production reminds us that this is a truly unforgettable piece. It has made an amazing journey, from its beginnings as a "concept album" on LP in 1970 to the stage premiere on Broadway, the London premiere that ran for seven years, the justly celebrated film version, and hugely successful presentations over the past four decades at venues large and small all over the world.

We hope *Jesus Christ Superstar* will thrill you, move you, and leave you eager to return to Lyric Opera next season.

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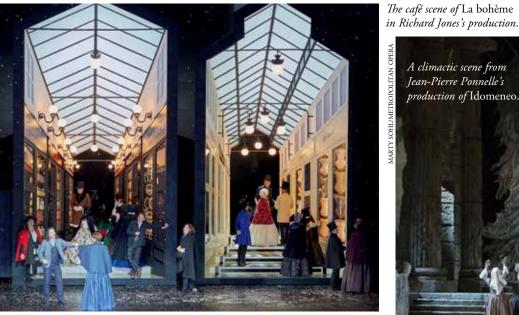

In working intensively on planning each season, "our music director, Sir Andrew Davis, and I are very conscious that the vast majority of our audience see opera only at Lyric," says Freud. "They'll rely on us to produce an exciting, varied, balanced diet of opera. With just eight mainstage operas a year, we can't hope to encompass the full range of works each season. We actually plan across a number of seasons together. I think about a rolling ten-year period, during which we hope to present a wonderfully thrilling cross-section of repertoire - a variety of

There's a great deal to look forward to next season at Lyric, with spectacular productions, four company premieres, thrilling debuts, a celebrity recital, and a glorious gala concert. No one is looking forward to it more than general director Anthony Freud, who recently took some time from his busy schedule to give all the exciting details.

styles musically, theatrically, and visually. We want to take our audience on an exciting and entertaining journey."

The 2018/19 season opens with Lyric's first new production in more than 40 years of Puccini's beloved and heartbreaking La bohème. For this coproduction with the Royal Opera House Covent Garden and Teatro Real Madrid, Lyric will welcome back Richard Jones, whom Freud admires for "an extraordinary ability to get to the heart of whatever piece he's directing. His Bohème is directed specifically from the text and

the music, with all sorts of revelatory details that are often missed in other productions. It's set very firmly in the mid-19th century, and it looks like most people would like Bohème to look - very romantic."

Returning to Lyric to sing her favorite role, the fragile seamstress Mimì, is Italian soprano Maria Agresta, after her warmly received debut in this season's Turandot. As the passionate poet Rodolfo, Lyric will introduce to Chicago the sensational young American tenor Michael Fabiano, who premiered



this production in London. Danielle de Niese, who dazzled Lyric audiences most recently as the glamorous leading lady of the world premiere of López's *Bel Canto*, will be Musetta, opposite the Marcello of the outstandingly gifted American baritone Zachary Nelson.

The Lyric debuts of Fabiano and Venezuelan conductor Domingo Hindoyan, who will be on the podium for *Bohème*, prompt Freud to mention the unusually large number of significant debuts next season. "We didn't particularly plan it that way, but it's exciting that we're allowing our audience not only to reacquaint themselves with so many favorite Lyric artists, but to get to know some thrilling new artists at the same time."

Idomeneo, viewed by Freud as "Mozart's Greek tragedy and his first truly great opera," will be new to much of the Lyric audience, having not been seen here since 1997/98. It's also a new addition to the vast repertoire of Sir Andrew Davis." Idomeneo is the one major Mozart opera he hasn't yet conducted," notes Freud. This story of the desperately conflicted King of Crete will star Matthew Polenzani, the Ryan Opera Center alumnus who has become one of the world's most celebrated tenors and recently triumphed as Idomeneo at the Metropolitan Opera. We can expect him to triumph again at Lyric in a role cited

by Freud as "enormously demanding, with its combination of grand-scale expansiveness, exceptional virtuosity, and intense emotional involvement."

Three ravishing artists will join Polenzani onstage: Chicago native Janai Brugger, returning to Lyric as Ilia after her great success in this season's Turandot; mezzo-soprano Angela Brower, an American based in Germany, who will debut as Idomeneo's noble-hearted son Idamante; and the remarkable Canadian-American soprano Erin Wall, a Ryan Opera Center alumna, returning to the company as the crazed princess Elettra. This superb quartet will be seen in a legendary production by the late Jean-Pierre Ponnelle originally seen at the Met, "a visual fusion of the ancient world and the world of the Enlightenment,



absolutely true to the essence of this score," says Freud.

There's nothing more ambitious for an opera company than to create a new production of Wagner's monumental Ring cycle. With Siegfried in 2018/19, Lyric moves into the third of the four Ring operas. "The first two, Das Rheingold and Die Walküre, got us off to a great start," says Freud. "When Sir Andrew and I first spoke to director David Pountney about directing Lyric's new Ring, we told him we wanted to reclaim this masterpiece for the theater. Over the years so much has been done to the Ring, and we felt that it had lost its deep connection to its theatrical roots. David took that literally, and has set the four operas within the skeleton of an old theater. Within that structure, the worlds of each of the operas

are quite different. In *Siegfried* the opera's events will be seen through the eyes of a child – the child being Siegfried himself. This fantastical, whimsical, imaginative world will be extraordinarily vivid in its storytelling."

In addition to the return of hugely acclaimed artists from Lyric's two previous Ring operas - Eric Owens (Wotan), Christine Goerke (Brünnhilde), and Samuel Youn (Alberich) - there will be several important debuts. "In the title role, a real Mount Everest for tenors, will be the German heroic tenor Burkhard Fritz. He's starred in many of the most challenging German dramatictenor parts, and it will be wonderful to welcome him here for his first Siegfried." Alongside Fritz in the crucial role of Mime will be Matthias Klink, who enjoys a major career in Europe in both lyric and character roles. Other debuts will be those of American mezzo-soprano Ronnita Miller as Erda and Ukrainian bass Andrii Goniukov as Fafner.

Verdi's *Il trovatore*, the ultimate riproaring Italian opera, boasts "an amazing sequence of glorious melodies that are invigorating, emotional, and demonic at the same time," says Freud. "A great performance of Trovatore - which is what we'll hear at Lyric – delivers grand opera at its most essential, most elemental." Three exceptional American artists figure prominently in Lyric's 2018/19 Trovatore: as the noblewoman Leonora, Tamara Wilson (debut), who has rapidly established herself internationally as one of today's few genuine Verdi sopranos; and two singers already familiar to Lyric audiences – mezzo-soprano Jamie Barton, returning in the hair-raising role of the gypsy Azucena, and tenor Russell Thomas, who will star in the title role of the valiant troubadour/warrior Manrico. There are two other notable debuts: "As Count di Luna, we'll welcome to Lyric a wonderful Romanian baritone, George Petean, who's become a sought-after Verdi specialist in major houses. Our Ferrando will be the young Italian bass, Roberto Tagliavini, an emerging star I was thrilled hear in Aida, with Riccardo Muti conducting, at last year's Salzburg Festival."

production will convey "all the darkness and sinister dimension that we know from paintings and drawings by Goya, which inspired the design. Lyric originated this *Trovatore*, a coproduction with the Met and San Francisco – it's been enormously successful in all three houses."

Who could be a more entrancing companion for the holiday season than Cinderella? At Lyric her tale will be told French style in Massenet's Cendrillon, the first of this season's four company premieres. "This is a warmly romantic, family-friendly version of the Cinderella story," says Freud. Sir Andrew Davis, who will conduct, is an extraordinary interpreter of Massenet's operas, a repertoire he dearly loves. The production that audiences will see at Lyric was led with huge success by Sir Andrew at Barcelona's Gran Teatre del Liceu. Its director, Laurent Pelly, "captures perfectly the unique cocktail of wit and romance that this opera offers," says Freud. "The production creates a very inventive, very touching fairytale world." The magnificent English mezzo-soprano Alice Coote returns to Lyric as Prince

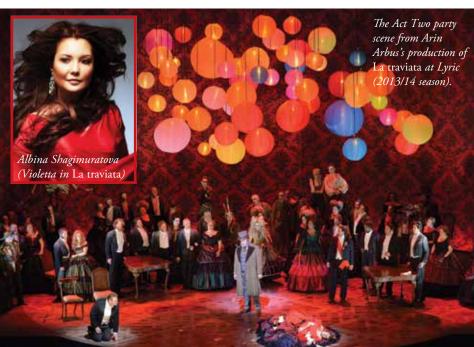

Charming. The other principals will all be debuting artists, including Australian soprano Siobhan Stagg in the title role and Canadian coloratura soprano Marie-Eve Munger as the Fairy Godmother.

Strauss's stupendous *Elektra* is a work that, in Freud's words, "delivers a punch to the solar plexus like no other." It returns to Lyric in a production originally directed by Sir David McVicar and designed by John Macfarlane - that "creates an extraordinarily oppressive, threatening, terrifying world, in which the tragedy of the central characters comes to brutal life." Audiences can look forward to two long-awaited Lyric debuts: as Elektra, Swedish soprano Nina Stemme, hailed by Freud as "one of the supreme interpreters of the most formidable dramatic roles of the German repertoire"; and one of Freud's longtime favorite conductors, Donald Runnicles, noted especially for German romantic music. "He's a great Straussian, also a great Wagnerian, and he and Nina Stemme have a close, longstanding professional relationship. I know how excited they are to be working with each other at Lyric."

Onstage once again at Lyric will be Verdi's best-loved opera, the gloriously romantic *La traviata*. The production, premiered here in 2013, is directed by



Arin Arbus, associate artistic director of New York's trailblazing Theatre for a New Audience. "Arin has found a compelling theatrical world for this favorite Verdi opera," says Freud. "She has really brought to life the central character of Violetta, and the world that she seduces - and that tragically seduces her." Leading the cast as Violetta is Albina Shagimuratova, the greatly acclaimed star of Lyric's Rigoletto, Lucia di Lammermoor, and I puritani. "Our audiences have

taken Albina to heart, and Violetta is a role she's sung with great success." Joining her will be the debuting Italian tenor Giorgio Berrugi ("He has a particularly warm, rich voice") and Serbian baritone Željko Lučić, one of today's premier Verdi interpreters. On the podium will be one of America's most outstanding young conductors, Michael Christie, another important debut.

The last of Lyric's eight mainstage operas, Ariodante, continues Lyric's

remarkable record in Handel's operas. "This is a real masterpiece, with Handel distilling his incredible genius for both melodic invention and psychological depth." Ariodante has a very powerful story, in which a villain dupes the opera's hero into thinking his fiancée has betrayed him. Audiences can expect these three formidable roles will be thrillingly sung and acted by Alice Coote (Ariodante), "who can break your heart and be completely spellbinding in the virtuoso arias"; in her Lyric debut, Brenda Rae (Ginevra), "a real singing actress, who I'm sure will be triumphantly successful in this role"; and Iestyn Davies (Polinesso), the brilliant countertenor recently acclaimed on Broadway in the new play Farinelli and the King.

On the podium for *Ariodante* will be Harry Bicket, one of the world's foremost interpreters of Baroque opera. After *Bohème*, Richard Jones will return to demonstrate his versatility directing a production that enjoyed a huge success at France's Aix-en-Provence Festival. With astonishing imagination, Jones moves the world of this opera from medieval Scotland to mid-20th-century Scotland.

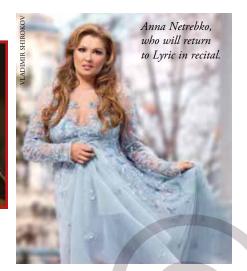

The "Broadway at Lyric" series continues next season with the company premiere of one of the greatest of all American musicals, Leonard Bernstein's West Side Story, a work that audiences have embraced worldwide for more than six decades. "This is Bernstein at his most emotional, and certainly most thrilling," declares Freud. "It also may be the most potent of all retellings of the Romeo and Juliet story - sadly, very relevant and topical today. The futility and pointlessness of prejudice and conflict will be vivid in this production." At the helm will be Francesca Zambello, director of Lyric productions as diverse as Tristan und Isolde, Salome, Show Boat, and Porgy and Bess.



The fourth Lyric premiere of 2018/19, produced at the Harris Theater, is Jack Perla's chamber opera *An American Dream*, a beautiful lyrical work set in the 1940s during World War Two. It contrasts very different but equally moving situations – on the one hand, a Japanese-American family forced to leave their home, and a Jewish-American woman who's concerned about her family left behind in Nazi Germany.

Two very exciting special events are part of the season. "On December 2 we'll give our audiences the rare opportunity to hear Anna Netrebko in recital. She is one of today's greatest stars, and I'm thrilled that she'll return to Lyric, collaborating with the distinguished pianist Malcolm Martineau. Then, on March 25, this season's gala concert will celebrate Renée Fleming's 25th anniversary with the company. Renée is one of the greatest artists of our time, and she has a very special association with us, not only as an artist but as our creative consultant. This will be a great chance to celebrate the artistry that has made Renée such an immensely admired and dearly loved figure in the recent history of Lyric."

Such a wealth of musical and theatrical pleasures await our audiences. Join Anthony Freud and the whole Lyric family for all the excitement next season!

ANDREW LLOYD WEBBER is the composer of some of the world's best known musicals including Cats, Evita, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, Jesus Christ Superstar, The

Phantom of the Opera (which celebrates its 30th anniversary on Broadway this year), and Sunset Boulevard. When Sunset Boulevard joined School of Rock - The Musical, Cats, and Phantom on Broadway in February 2017, he became the only person to equal the record set in 1953 by Rodgers and Hammerstein with four shows running concurrently. As well as The Phantom of the Opera and Cats, his productions include the groundbreaking Bombay Dreams which introduced the double Oscar-winning Bollywood composer A. R. Rahman to the Western stage. His awards, both as composer and producer, include seven Tonys, seven Oliviers, a Golden Globe, an Oscar, the Praemium Imperiale, the Richard Rodgers Award for Excellence in Musical Theatre, a BASCA Fellowship, the Kennedy Center Honor, and a Grammy for Best Contemporary Classical Composition for Requiem, his setting of the Latin Requiem Mass which contains one of his best known compositions, "Pie Jesu." He owns seven London theaters, including the Theatre Royal, Drury Lane and the London Palladium. He was knighted by Her Majesty The Queen in 1992 and created a life peer in 1997. He is passionate about the importance of music in education, and the Andrew Lloyd Webber Foundation has become one of Britain's leading charities supporting the arts and music. In 2016 the foundation funded a major new national initiative which endowed the American Theatre Wing with a \$1.3 million, three-year grant to support theatre education opportunities for underserved young people and public schools across the U.S. His autobiography Unmasked, published by HarperCollins to mark his 70th birthday, is out now.



TIM RICE has worked in music, theater, and films since 1965, when he met Andrew Lloyd Webber, a fellow struggling songwriter. Rather than pursue Rice's ambitions to write rock or pop songs, they

turned their attention to Webber's obsession – musical theater. Their first collaboration (lyrics by Rice, music by Lloyd Webber), was an unsuccessful show based on the life of Dr. Barnardo, the Victorian philanthropist, *The Likes Of Us.* Their next three works together were much more successful – *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, Jesus Christ Superstar*, and *Evita.* Rice has since worked with other distinguished popular composers,

such as Elton John (The Lion King, Aida), Alan Menken (Aladdin, King David, Beauty and the Beast), Bjorn Ulvaeus and Benny Andersson (Chess), and most recently, Stuart Brayson (From Here to Eternity). A new production of From Here to Eternity made its debut at the Finger Lakes Musical Theatre, New York, in 2016, and played the following year at Maine's Ogunquit Playhouse. Also in 2017, two films with new Tim Rice material were released: Disney's fresh interpretation of Beauty and the Beast, features three new songs written with Alan Menken; and the latest Roger Goldby film, Time of Their Lives, starring Joan Collins and Pauline Collins, features "Morty and Me," a song written with Pete Hobbs. Tim formed his own cricket team in 1973 and was president of the U. K.'s premier cricket club, the MCC, in 2002. He is a regular broadcaster/presenter on BBC Radio 2, drawing on his extensive knowledge of the history of popular music since Elvis was a lad. He has won several awards*, mainly for the wrong thing or for simply turning up.

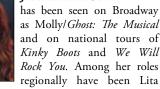

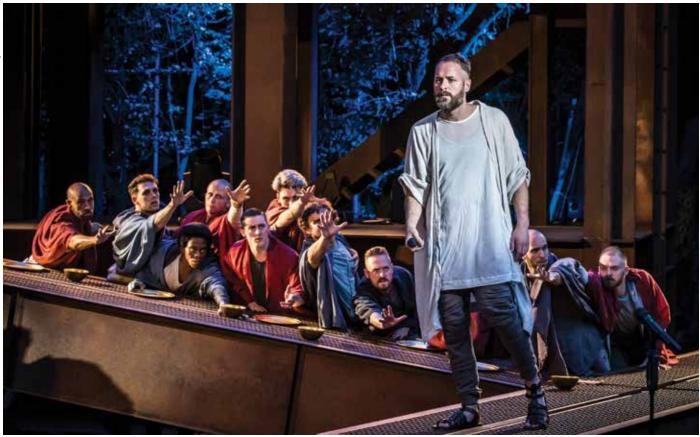

MUSICAL NOTES | LYRIC OPERA OF CHICAGO

Rock. Opera. Revolution. By Cory Lippiello

ne of the most beloved and memorable musical theater achievements of the 20th century did not begin as an expensive theatrical outing that only a select few could afford to enjoy. Instead, this revolution began in homes and churches and parties and dorm rooms, with a few dollars spent at the record store. It began with a sharp needle placed delicately on the edge of a piece of vinyl, the first spit and crackle giving way to power chords. It began as a sound, a ritual, a singalong, a lesson, a communion. It became a phenomenon.

In 1965 a 17-year-old composition prodigy named Andrew Lloyd Webber received a brief letter from an aspiring lyricist. Tim Rice was only a few years older, and had left law school to begin a career in the music industry. In the letter, he proposed that he was the "with it' writer of lyrics" that Lloyd Webber sought for his musical ideas. Their first few years of collaboration yielded a musical about the founder of homes for poor children that went unproduced, a handful of songs, and a 20-minute biblical "pop cantata" for a local school choir based on the story of Joseph, son of Jacob and owner of one special coat. Some might say this was a rather inauspicious beginning.

The pair returned to biblical source material for their next piece. Using a composite of the Gospels of the New Testament as their storytelling framework, Lloyd Webber and Rice decided to tell the story of the last seven days in the life of Christ. The character of Jesus was presented as a man, not a superman, and included a healthy dose of Judas's anguished perspective, a subject that had long captivated Rice. The tension between the two characters was apparent throughout, and the piece used the familiar story to riff on ideas of fame, control, politics, and power.

The show, *Jesus Christ Superstar*, failed to find a theatrical backer.

However, while Rice and Lloyd Webber labored on their new project, a different revolution had begun. Though popular music had drifted further afield from the sounds of the Gershwins, musical theater had been reluctant to incorporate the sounds of the day. The previous decade had produced hits like *A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum* (1962) and *Cabaret* (1966), but this music was a far cry from what kids were listening to on the radio. Even the most successful productions still adhered to the same kind of book/song formulas (and sounds) that had been the model for 30 years.

And then came *Hair*. First performed off-Broadway in 1967, and then on Broadway a year later, with book and lyrics by James Rado and Gerome Ragni and music by Galt McDermott, this groundbreaking show featured a memorable collection of songs, loosely organized around a timely anti-war story. This was a musical about the times, written in the rock music idiom of the times, performed by talented young people and staged with the period's experimental theater aesthetic. People of all ages and backgrounds went crazy for it.

There was more to come. In 1969 The Who had a huge hit with their concept album Tommy. Driven by the crash of Keith Moon's drums and Pete Townshend's aggressive rhythm guitar, the double album told the story of a deaf, dumb, and blind boy who relies on his imagination and sense of touch to cope with trauma. The band toured throughout 1970 with countless live shows, playing the album in its entirety everywhere from Woodstock to the Metropolitan Opera. In 1971 Seattle Opera opened its doors to new audiences with a fully staged production, directed by Richard Pearlman (later the director of Lyric's young-artist program) and starring a 26-year-old Bette Midler as The Acid Queen.

Into this sonic maelstrom, Lloyd Webber and Rice's "Brown Album" was born (so called because of the now-iconic simple brown cover with gold angels, designed by Ernie Cefalu for the American market). Since Jesus Christ Superstar had failed to catch fire with potential producers of a staged version, the creators took their cue from Tommy and arranged to make an album instead. The title track was released as a single in 1969, and was enough to catch the attention of MCA/Decca, the label responsible for releasing Tommy - and the duo's old pop cantata. Seeing profit potential, the label agreed to produce the rest of the album, releasing it in 1970.

From the first thrilling squeal of the electric guitar in the overture, to the eternally funky bass line of "Heaven on their Minds," to the rock tenor scream of "Gethsemane," the songs themselves reflected not just a pale mimicry of rock and roll but a legitimate rock sound, driven by a killer rhythm section. Called a "rock opera" The world-famous cover of the original concept album, released in 1970.

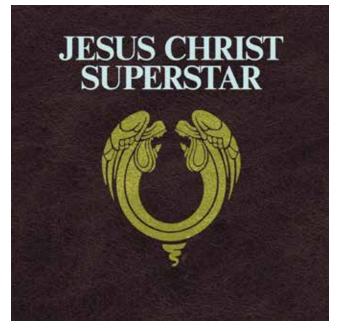
by the creators, the show was sung through with no additional spoken dialogue - the album was the entire show. The score also brought in unexpected sounds from other genres: the soul stroll of the high priests, the jangly guitar finger picking of "Pilate's Dream," the honkytonk piano of Herod's song, and the plaintive folk sound of "I Don't Know How to Love Him." Rice's colloquial lyrics seemed almost ridiculously casual at times, yet succeeded in making the characters imminently relatable.

The cast assembled for the early recording was equally diverse, a combination of established rock singers, theater regulars, and brand new artists. Ian Gillan of the band Deep Purple performed

Jesus and Michael D'Abo, the lead singer for Manfred Mann, played Herod. Singer Murray Head was performing in the West End production of *Hair* when he was selected to sing Judas, and Chicago-born actor Barry Dennen created the role of Pilate. Mary was sung by then-unknown Yvonne Elliman, jumpstarting her career.

The album was a massive hit.

With the album reaching #1 on the US *Billboard* charts, a staged production was inevitable – but it's no secret that Lloyd Webber and Rice loathed the first Broadway production. Directed by Tom O'Horgan, fresh from his success directing *Hair*, it starred Jeff Fenholt as Jesus and Ben Vereen as Judas, with Elliman and Dennen reprising their roles as Mary and Pilate. But what had worked for the free-wheeling



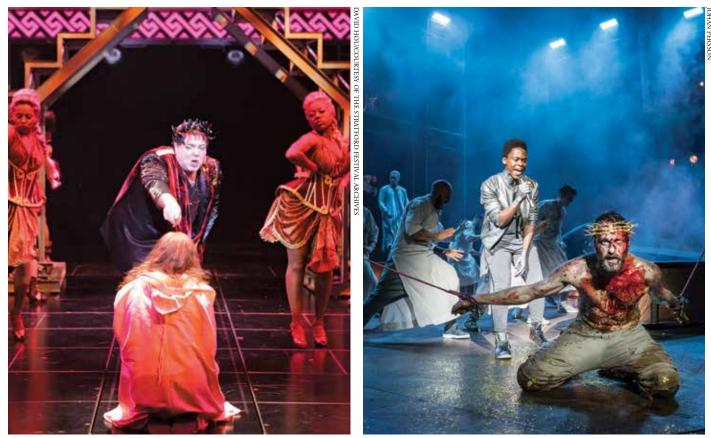


An excited moment from the ensemble in the 2000 Broadway revival.

aesthetic of *Hair* did not translate well for *Superstar*. Opening on Broadway a year after the album's release, Lloyd Webber found it "vulgar." It received both mediocre reviews and protests from religious groups – though it ran for a respectable 771 performances.

A more successful West End production followed in 1972, and director Norman Jewison's film, shot on location in Israel, appeared in theaters in 1973. It starred Ted Neeley as Jesus and Carl Anderson as Judas, both of whom had been understudies in the Broadway production. The movie would forever link Neeley and Anderson to the show, with many audiences regarding them as these roles' definitive interpreters.

Staged productions around the world followed in quick succession. Tours crossed

the United States in 1976, 1992 (with Neeley and Anderson), and 2006 (with Neeley and Corey Glover of the band Living Colour as Judas). The show was revived on Broadway in 1977. A 1996 West End production, directed by Gale Edwards, was subsequently revived in 2000 in New York. Des McAnuff's production originated at Ontario's Stratford Festival in 2011 and moved to Broadway in 2012. Most recently, there was a U.K. and Australian arena tour in 2014. This short list doesn't take into account the thousands of professional regional theaters, amateur theatrical groups, community playhouses, churches, and schools that have created productions in the 48 years since the album first appeared.

And is it any wonder? Beyond the aural excitement of the songs themselves, this telling of the story speaks to us in ways that have only become more profound over the years. Everywhere we see people living in the tension of occupied territory, people looking for a new doctrine that promises hope and deliverance from poverty and oppression, people desperate for new leaders and new opportunities. Recommendations for routes to salvation abound.

By positing Jesus as a "superstar" in pop culture terms, it is even easier to find parallels in everyday life. This is not just a story about faith and politics, but an exploration of how fame leads to infamy, and how fandom leads to mania. How do the weeping and fainting of thousands of young women seeing Sinatra at the Paramount in 1942 become a violent riot in front of the Rolling Stones at Altamont in 1969? In 1975, five years after the "Brown Album" was released, Led Zeppelin's Robert Plant would famously declare in an interview, "I am a golden god!" Plant was keenly aware of the power of his voice and magnetic presence; he knew in that moment he could ask an audience to do anything. And he is one of many: the rock god looms large in the iconography of the late 20th century.

Golden rock gods and the gods of Valhalla have more in common than one would think. Opera tells us stories of fame,



self-sacrifice, corruption, and power, and thematically Superstar finds a place next to Carmen, Madama Butterfly, Don Carlo, and the Ring cycle. Opera similarly magnifies our humanity, using music to explore our most elemental hopes and fears by putting characters in situations where the stakes are unbearably high. The music of Superstar brings the same thrilling sound that we love from our opera singers when they are singing at the extremes of their vocal ranges, vibrating in that liminal space of impossible sound. Opera singers and rock singers vocalize the most intense emotions and experiences on our behalf. That visceral call becomes a literal cry to the heavens in Superstar, a show that features no fewer than five tenors singing in roughly the same range as Wagner's Siegfried.

Superstar resides comfortably, appropriately, in several worlds. Concept albums, a bit like the modern version of the 19th-century song cycle, see Superstar keeping company with other masterworks, from Bowie's The Rise and Fall of Ziggy Stardust and the Spiders from Mars (1972) to Beyoncé's Lemonade (2016). Superstar also joins Hair on the vanguard of musical theater's use of popular music idioms, influencing almost 50 years of musical theater from Grease (1971) to Hamilton (2015). And with its thematic scope and heart-stopping vocalism, Superstar lives alongside our grandest works in the operatic repertory.

The production performed at Lyric was first presented by Regent's Park Open Air Theatre in London, where it won the 2016 Olivier Award for Best Musical Revival. Directed by Timothy Sheader, the production reflects a desire to return to the concept album roots by imagining the staging as a kind of concert. Principals step out of the group and sing their songs directly to the audience. As always, there is no spoken text. The production by Tom Scutt is striking visually, spare and a touch industrial. Artists surge onto the stage, greet each other, dance together. Choreography by Drew McOnie is athletic and intricate, and combines a dozen different styles to create a gestural language common to the tribe on stage. Particularly evident in this production is the visible escalation of the crowd from happily frenzied acolytes to a dangerous raging mob. It is a communal performance, a tribute, a rite. And as is fitting in an opera house, the focus is always on the extraordinary voices.

Lloyd Webber and Rice have gone on to other legendary successes, together and separately, but *Superstar* remains unique in their catalog. Created in an extraordinary convergence of time, sound, story, and audience, it remains an important touchstone in the history of popular and theatrical music. And whether it is performed in an opera house, a theater, a school, or someone's living room, the show feels as electrifying and urgent as when it first took a spin on the turntable.

REGENT'S PARK THEATRE LTD

Established in 1932, Regent's Park Open Air Theatre is one of London's largest theaters. Situated in the beautiful surroundings of a Royal Park, both stage and auditorium are entirely uncovered. The theatre is celebrated for bold, dynamic productions (*Jesus Christ Superstar, The Seagull, Porgy and Bess, The Crucible, Henry V*), with audiences of over 140,000 each year during its 18-week season.

Timothy Sheader and William Village were appointed joint chief executives in 2007. During their tenure, To Kill a Mockingbird and The Sound of Music won the WhatsOnStage Best Play Revival and Best Musical Revival Awards, respectively. Into the Woods won the Olivier Award for Best Musical Revival and transferred to the Delacorte Theatre, Central Park, New York in 2012. Hello, Dolly! won the Evening Standard Award for Best Musical, alongside three more Olivier Awards. The recordbreaking 2011 production of Crazy for You transferred to London's West End, winning Olivier Awards for Best Musical Revival and Best Costume Design. The 2016 sell-out production of Jesus Christ Superstar won the Olivier Award for Best Musical Revival and Evening Standard Award for Best Musical, and the production returned to the Open Air Theatre for an extended run in 2017.



The theater's ambition of reaching new audiences beyond the Park has seen their productions of *Pride and Prejudice*, *Lord of the Flies*, and *To Kill a Mockingbird* tour the U. K. and Ireland, the latter subsequently transferring to London's Barbican Centre for a month-long residency. Their coproduction with Chichester Festival Theatre of Michael Morpurgo's *Running Wild* toured the U. K. in 2017. The 2018 season includes *Peter Pan, As You Like It, Little Shop of Horrors,* and, in a coproduction with English National Opera, Benjamin Britten's *The Turn of the Screw.*

Director Timothy Sheader talks about Jesus Christ Superstar

I was attracted to *Jesus Christ Superstar* because of the music on the original album. I knew the odd track, but when I listened to the piece as a whole, I fell in love with it. This is a seminal work in musical-theater history. Those young men were listening to Pink Floyd, The Beatles, and David Bowie. Through a concept album, they created a theatrical experience, and that's what led to the thinking behind this production; the conductor and I listening as one might listen to an album.

I haven't approached the show as a linear/ naturalistic retelling of the Passion, because it's not; some of it is made up, and all of it is from the point of view of one particular character. It's not weighed down by dialogue, which helps to retain an abstractedness, an epic quality. Our production is more about authentic musicmaking than strict narrative telling. It doesn't set the show in a recognizable locale and period. The costumes, for example, were based on a response to clothes we saw being worn in the neighborhoods we live and work in; these in turn are influenced by performers such as Kanye West. They also suggest silhouettes of ubiquitous religious garments we recognize throughout millennia.

I'm less interested in Jesus as a character and more in the performer who is singing the role. The casting took so long because throughout the auditions, we were looking for individuality and authenticity. We worked hard to assemble a group whose voices complement each other. I never looked for actors, whose greatest strength is playing somebody else.

Regarding the design, we considered a lot of contemporary images of crucifixions, of people lashed to makeshift crosses in the Middle East. A lyric that stands out for me is "He's a man, he's just a man"; we wanted the crucifixion to be brutal – a man whose bones are broken and who is painfully suffocated. This would be juxtaposed with a heightened majestic ending; as we turn the broken runway cross we have danced on all evening into a luminous golden icon, akin to those we pray to or wear around our necks. A glorification of this man's death.

I suspect that this is the most choreographed *Jesus Christ Superstar* to date. There aren't many musicals where you have to dance with this level of ability while singing these harmonies. We couldn't carry non-dancing singers or non-singing dancers. My original direction was that this should feel like a cross between a dance concert and a music gig. I didn't want to see people standing around talking in naturalistic tableaux.

I'm interested in the mob mentality, in how people work as groups, in what we do to individuals, be that in religion or in society at large, and what we sometimes do to artists and celebrities. There's a lot of uniformity in the choreography – disciples, choosing to follow one person. They're all together, with a passionate, dynamic quality to the movement, expressing firstly their joy and ecstasy, secondly their violence and anger. There would always be a big group, a tribe, coming together like putting on a Passion Play, to tell this story through music and dance.

We never thought of body mics – it was always hand-held. That was a very early decision. I wanted to honor the period in which the piece was written. One nice thing we heard a lot was that the show didn't feel dated, it felt contemporary. Hand-held mics were to take us back into the gig environment. They helped people in rehearsal, so they could stop acting. With Jesus in "Gethsemane," I said, "I just need this to feel like you wrote the song – it's a song for you and your guitar, to sing at a gig."

One of the great joys of doing the production in Chicago is the orchestra. I don't believe a three-week run of *Jesus Christ Superstar* has been done with an orchestra of this size. I hope Lyric audiences will be exhilarated by the music and thrilled by the electricity of the performances. Because of the gig-like quality of the production, we're able to create a really strong connection between performer and audience, so they'll feel present and almost as if they're part of a live music concert where you might not be sitting down. I'd love to direct this show in a production where everyone could stand up!

- How is this portrayal of Jesus different from those you've seen, whether in movies or in musicals such as *Godspell*?
- How do you respond to this universally known story being told from a different perspective that of Judas?
- There are some historical inaccuracies in the piece. Can you accept them for the sake of the plot and of the music, or should sacred stories onstage always remain absolutely true to their source material?
- What does the show say about the period in which it was written?
- Can the show be updated to any time period and affect audiences the same way?
- What do you think are the qualities of the show that enable it to connect with audiences who may not have been raised with the story?

Rose L. and Sidney N. Shure: Amplifying Lyric

Sidney N. Shure founded Shure Radio Company in 1925, with offices located at 19 South Wells Street, just two blocks from the future site of the Civic Opera Building. During the Great Depression, when factory-built radio sets became more affordable than the radio kits supplied by his Company, Mr. Shure pivoted his Company's efforts to developing its own microphones. At the start of World War II, having had great success in microphones, Shure landed a contract with the military, producing microphones used to communicate between tanks, through pilot oxygen masks, and over battleship intercoms. Each product was designed to meet the strict military standards required for battlefield conditions, a level of durability still maintained by the Company today.

In 1949, a bright young woman named Rose Langer landed in Mr. Shure's office as his executive assistant. Hard working and ferociously intelligent, Rose quickly proved to be a worthy partner, both in business and in life. Sidney and Rose were married in 1954, and such was their joint leadership that the Board of Directors elected Rose to succeed her husband as Chairman of Shure Incorporated after his death in 1995. She held that role until her passing in January 2016.

"My aunt didn't have any children of her own," says Barbara Levie, Rose Shure's niece. "Her business was like her family, and she felt close to everyone she worked with." Aside from being extremely clever and businessminded, Barbara describes Rose as "almost regal. She had a style about her and a certain presence that was very unusual."

Barbara's father would often bring her and her brother to Rose's apartment for a day-long adventure. "She would take us on the El downtown, and we'd get on the first car so we could watch the train go into the subway. We would go out to lunch, then to Fannie May Candy, and finally to an opera or a play. Afterward, we'd always go to Kroch's and Brentano's, and we were each allowed to buy a book. It was a very enriching experience, and that's how I grew to appreciate the arts."

As for the Company they built together, Shure Incorporated is one of the world's leading manufacturers of audio equipment,



with a reputation for exceptional quality, backed by excellent customer service. The Company's industry standard microphone, the SM58^{*}, will undoubtedly be found in the hands of Adam Levine on Maroon 5's next tour. Pop stars of the 50s and 60s were regularly photographed crooning into the iconic Model 55 Unidyne^{*}. Those who tune in to Presidential addresses have heard the Shure SM57, the microphone used on the White House lectern since Lyndon B. Johnson held the top office. Wherever sound is produced, Shure is there.

The presence of Shure products at the opera house might seem counterintuitive because Lyric's mainstage opera singers rarely use amplification. But there are always exceptions. In 2003, Shure Incorporated and Mrs. Shure generously donated significant equipment to Lyric. Speaking voices during operettas and children's singing voices are usually not strong enough to be heard unaided throughout the opera house. Lyric has, for many years, counted on Shure's leading technology to smoothly transition from unamplified singing to spoken dialogue, and back again.

In 2012, Lyric began regularly presenting great works from the musical theater canon.

Unlike operas, all singing and dialogue are amplified in these productions, and this was something Lyric was just beginning to learn how to do effectively in a theater designed for unamplified sound. That year, Shure Incorporated provided another generous in-kind donation of microphones and other amplification equipment, including wireless microphone bodypacks that fit unobtrusively in singers' wardrobes. That equipment was used by Lyric as it made its successful transition into its Musical Theater Initiative, with such productions as Rodgers and Hammerstein's The Sound of Music, The King and I, and Lerner and Loewe's My Fair Lady last spring.

In addition to equipment donations, Mr. and Mrs. Shure gave generously throughout their lifetimes, and Shure Incorporated continues its legacy of financial support. Never taking for granted their position in life, Mr. and Mrs. Shure delighted in giving back to organizations that brought them joy. Upon her death in 2016, Rose left

bequests to several charitable organizations, including Lyric. In addition, Lyric is grateful to receive continued support from the Shure Charitable Trust created under the Will of Sidney N. Shure, which is also making grants to numerous charitable organizations.

"She truly loved Lyric; it was one of her most revered charities," Barbara says. "They had four or more seats for every opera, and even after my uncle died, my aunt would invite three people to go with her and take them to dinner in the Graham Room before the opera. It was her highlight." To honor Rose and Sidney, the Trustees of the Charitable Trust named their four subscription seats on the main floor of the Ardis Krainik Theater with plaques on each one reading, "In Loving Memory of Rose L. and Sidney N. Shure."

Mr. Shure is remembered at Shure Incorporated as saying of the Company, "We know very well that absolute perfection cannot be attained, but we will never stop striving for it." Lyric is grateful that some of that nearperfection made its way to Lyric, both onstage and off.
