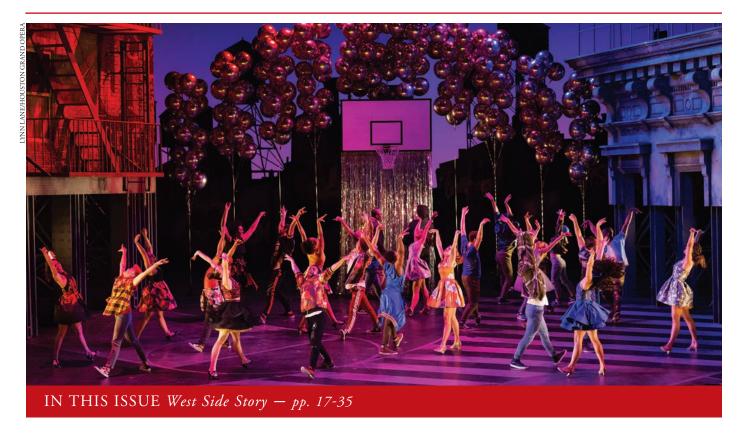

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From the General Director and Chairman

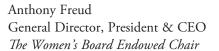
Welcome to Lyric! Whether you're a first-timer or a regular visitor at the Lyric Opera House, we're thrilled that you've joined us for *West Side Story*, a musical-theater masterpiece.

It was hugely gratifying to all of us at Lyric to witness the reaction of our audiences when it was announced that we would be producing *West Side Story* this season. From emails, letters, phone calls, and subsequently the conversations we've had with patrons throughout the season, we've felt tremendous excitement. It's been clear from the start that this show has created a special connection with people everywhere. In so many cases, that connection has been lifelong; whether seeing the show onstage or on film, it remains unforgettable.

The story the show tells is sadly very relevant and topical today, particularly in cities like ours. In creating *West Side Story*, Leonard Bernstein, Stephen Sondheim, Arthur Laurents, and Jerome Robbins made a very powerful statement. How devastatingly they bring out the absolute futility of the prejudice and conflict revealed by the passionate young men and women who populate this modern-day *Romeo and Juliet*. The hope that "there's a place for us" is so deeply moving, with Sondheim's simple, beautiful text complementing Bernstein's exquisite music.

And there is so much else to enjoy here – the incomparable melodies, the dancing, the romance. We're excited to bring it all to you with a thrilling young cast full of "triple-threat" performers. Everyone onstage has the talent to make something totally memorable of these wonderful characters. As the idealistic lovers, Tony and Maria, you'll see and hear two bright stars of musical theater: Corey Cott, a familiar face on Broadway, and Mikaela Bennett, who portrayed Maria last year for the BBC Proms in London. The other principals – Amanda Castro (Anita), Brett Thiele (Riff), and Manuel Stark Santos (Bernardo) – are spectacular dancers who will bring tremendous brilliance and electricity to Jerome Robbins's dances.

Francesca Zambello has directed some extraordinary productions here, including American works (*Porgy and Bess, Show Boat*). Francesca's staging of *West Side Story*, which has already triumphed at Houston Grand Opera, the Glimmerglass Festival, Lyric Opera of Kansas City, and Atlanta Opera, is truly astonishing in its dramatic impact. With a formidably gifted production team and the brilliant James Lowe – who led Lyric's wonderful *Oklahoma!* – again on the podium, *West Side Story* will thrill and exhilarate you, when it isn't breaking your heart.



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A Season to Sing About

Lyric's general director Anthony Freud introduces the delights of 2019/20

Excitement is building for the 2019/20 season at Lyric! With so many brilliant artists, so many unforgettably passionate stories, so much glorious music, and one memorable production after another, you're sure to be enthralled by every performance you attend. You can pick from the central composers of the repertoire — Mozart, Wagner, Verdi, Puccini — while also discovering works by such outstanding contemporary composers as Jake Heggie and Jeanine Tesori.

Lyric's general director Anthony Freud and music director Sir Andrew Davis aim to establish an artistic pattern within each season, and 2019/20 is no exception. For example, the company will be moving in two new directions: producing a new or recent work every season (more on that below) and inaugurating a series of early Verdi operas, which will continue for at least five seasons.

"The early operas of Verdi present a

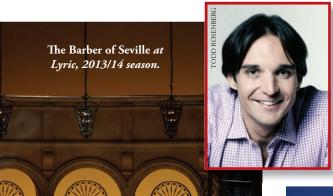
fantastic range of repertoire," says Freud, "and they're not frequently performed. The finest among them have real dramatic coherence, and the music is fantastic! We can produce these operas at the highest level, with outstanding singing and conducting."

The early-Verdi series will be launched with *Luisa Miller*, not heard at Lyric since 1981. It's one of the strongest Verdi works of this period – a powerful romantic drama, in which an innocent village girl falls in love with a nobleman who's already engaged to be married. As with all the operas next season, "the cast is as good as it gets," declares Freud. He looks forward to Bulgarian soprano Krassimira Stoyanova's return in the title role, after her wonderful Lyric debut as Amelia in Verdi's *Simon Boccanegra*. Also returning to Lyric's stage are Joseph Calleja (Luisa's beloved Rodolfo), Quinn Kelsey (Miller, Luisa's father), and

Christian Van Horn (Count Walter, Rodolfo's father), all great favorites here. "To have Alisa Kolosova, our beautiful Olga in *Eugene Onegin* two seasons ago, in the small but important role of Federica is luxury casting," adds Freud, "and I'm very pleased that the marvelous young American bass Soloman Howard will debut with us as Wurm, the opera's villain – he'll also be Fafner in our *Ring* cycle." Enrique Mazzola, who brought such power, elegance, and energy to *Lucia di Lammermoor* and *I puritani* in recent seasons, returns to conduct *Luisa Miller*.

Two other hugely popular Italian works will also be part of 2019/20. "If you asked someone to name the greatest comic opera," says Freud, "most people would say Rossini's *The Barber of Seville*," which will open the season in exhilarating style. Broadway's Rob Ashford will return to

direct the effervescent Lyric production that marked his operatic debut in 2013/14. Sir Andrew Davis will be on the podium for this comic gem.

Freud is eagerly anticipating the return of four remarkable artists in Barber, all of whom have recently delighted Lyric audiences. Adam Plachetka, who debuted at Lyric as the "other" Figaro (Mozart's), will be back as Rossini's ever-resourceful barber. Marianne Crebassa (Rosina) was previously Lyric's irresistible Dorabella in Così fan tutte and impish Stéphano in Romeo and Juliet. Lawrence Brownlee (Almaviva) created a sensation in Lyric's La Cenerentola, I puritani, and Charlie Parker's Yardbird. Brownlee's character in Barber has a spectacular final aria, so difficult that it's often cut in stage performances, but "when you have an Almaviva like Lawrence Brownlee, of course you do that aria," declares Freud. The king of Rossini comedy, legendary Italian baritone Alessandro Corbelli, returns to reprise his incomparable portrayal of pompous Dr. Bartolo, and the exceptionally gifted young Polish bass Krzysztof Bączyk debuts as Don Basilio.

Another Italian work that invariably thrills Lyric audiences is Puccini's exquisite romantic tragedy, *Madama Butterfly*, the tale of a Japanese geisha and the feckless American Navy lieutenant she loves. At the Met, the Vienna State Opera, and many other major houses internationally, the opera's title role has brought ecstatic acclaim to one of Lyric's most cherished artists, Ana

María Martínez, for whom Butterfly is her eighth role with the company. Brian Jagde (Pinkerton) returns to Puccini at Lyric, where he made a triumphant debut five seasons ago in *Tosca*. Starring in the March 5 and 8 performances will be two other world-renowned artists: the radiant Armenian soprano Lianna Haroutounian, a star of Covent Garden and San Francisco Opera, in her company debut, and Lyric favorite Brandon Jovanovich, in the first of four Lyric roles he sings in 2019/20. Henrik Nánási conducts the beautiful production originally directed by Olivier and Tony Award-winner Michael Grandage.

Mozart works are central to Lyric's repertoire, and *Don Giovanni* is the Mozart opera most closely associated with the company (it launched Lyric in 1954, and new productions opened both the 50th- and 60th-anniversary seasons). Goodman Theatre

artistic director Robert Falls's 2014/15 production is a riveting updating of the work, placing it in the period between World War I and the Spanish Civil War. There's big news in the cast, with no fewer than seven Lyric debuts! Only Matthew Rose (Leporello) and Ryan Opera Center alumna Amanda Majeski (Donna Elvira) have appeared with the company before. Two uniquely charismatic artists, Ildar Abdrazakov and Davide Luciano, will share the title role. Others making eagerly awaited debuts are Rachel Willis-Sørensen (Donna Anna), Ying Fang (Zerlina), Ben Bliss (Don Ottavio), Brandon Cedel (Masetto), and Mika Kares (Commendatore). Returning to Lyric - and to Mozart - will be James Gaffigan, after his elegant conducting of Così fan tutte last season.

Bel canto fireworks will be highlighted in three semi-staged concerts starring Sondra

learning secret of win-

ning at cards. Starring in that role - vocally and dramatically one of the toughest for a tenor in the entire repertoire - will be Brandon Jovanovich, whose role debut was an enormous success at last summer's Salzburg Festival. The distinguished American mezzo-soprano Jane Henschel debuts at Lyric as Lisa's formidable grandmother, the Countess, one of the most riveting character parts in opera. Lucas Meachem (Yeletsky) and Samuel Youn (Tomsky) join this outstanding cast, which also includes Elizabeth DeShong (Pauline) and Jill Grove (the Governess). Freud commissioned Richard Jones's astoundingly imaginative production at Welsh National Opera, where it premiered in 2000, subsequently earning acclaim at many other major houses internationally. Director of Lyric's Jenufa,

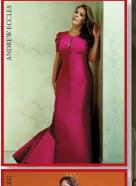

audiences' attention by planning to include a new or recent opera in every mainstage season. In 2019/20 that work, presented in its long-awaited Lyric premiere, will be one of the most widely heard new American operas of recent years, Jake Heggie and Terrence McNally's riveting Dead Man Walking, based on the book by Sister Helen Prejean.

The opera examines Sister Helen's role as spiritual adviser to a convicted murderer on Death Row, and the nun's own personal crisis of faith. She will be portrayed by Patricia Racette (role debut), one of America's most remarkable singing actresses. Both a role debut (as the murderer Joseph De Rocher) and company debut will be made by Ryan McKinny, the brilliant young American bass-baritone. World-renowned Susan Graham, who created Sister Helen in the opera's 2000 world premiere and recently took on the role of Joseph's anguished mother at Washington National Opera, will reprise that hugely acclaimed portrayal at Lyric. The conductor will be Nicole Paiement (debut), rapidly ascending to the top rank among today's most outstanding young conductors. Freud, who presented director Leonard Foglia's production of Dead Man Walking at Houston Grand Opera, emphasizes that "the opera examines

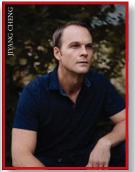

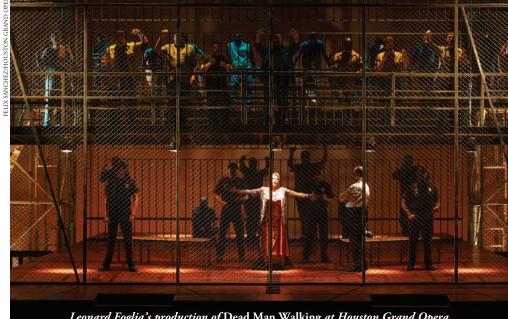

the human issues surrounding the death penalty, exploring its impact on both the families of the victims and that of the prisoner awaiting execution."

Of course, the crowning glory of the season will be the *Ring*, with complete cycles in three consecutive weeks, beginning April 13, 2020. Sir Andrew Davis will return to Wagner's masterpiece in Lyric's new production directed by David Pountney. Having proceeded with one opera each season since *Das Rheingold* premiered in 2016/17, the company will debut the new *Götterdämmerung* (*Twilight of the Gods*) in two performances, before the cycles begin. The third cycle will be exclusively matinees, a Lyric first for the *Ring*.

Götterdämmerung is a spectacular climax to the cycle. Theatrically the piece is more in the tradition of 19th-century grand romantic opera than the rest of the cycle, says Freud, but the music takes the opera to a whole new level of imagination. And, like the rest of the Ring, this final opera of the cycle presents Wagner's orchestra as a key protagonist, illuminating every scene with extraordinary beauty, power, and theatricality. The experience of hearing it in context – that is, preceded within the same week by Das Rheingold, Die Walküre, and Siegfried – is an essential experience for any operagoer.

The leading artists, all of whom received huge praise when the first three operas premiered, will all be returning: Eric Owens (Wotan), Christine Goerke (Brünnhilde),

Burkhard Fritz (Siegfried), Samuel Youn (Alberich), Tanja Ariane Baumgartner (Fricka, Waltraute), Brandon Jovanovich (Froh, Siegmund), and Elisabet Strid (Sieglinde; a rising star, Ryan Opera Center alumna Laura Wilde, sings the role in the third cycle). Together they will make this *Ring* truly unforgettable.

As has been the case for the past five years, Lyric Unlimited will enhance the season with a chamber opera, produced at Chicago Shakespeare Theater in Lyric's very first collaboration with CST. "The chamber operas," says Freud, "have been new and

topical, and each work has resonated deeply with audiences." The work next season will be Jeanine Tesori and Tazewell Thompson's *Blue* in its Midwest premiere, following the world premiere in July at the Glimmerglass Festival. This opera brings audiences into the emotional epicenter of an African-American family, in which the father is a police officer and the son a politically active teenager. Freud considers *Blue* "a wonderful opportunity to bring an important new work to the city in an ideal new venue for Lyric Unlimited performances."

The annual musical next season is 42nd Street, the dazzling, fabulously entertaining story of a chorus girl's leap to Broadway stardom. Harry Warren's songs have been highlights of the American songbook, including "You're Getting to Be a Habit with Me," "We're in the Money," "I Only Have Eyes for You," and of course, "Lullaby of Broadway." The show will be presented in an electrifying production directed and choreographed by Stephen Mear, rapturously received when it premiered in 2016 at Paris's Théâtre du Châtelet.

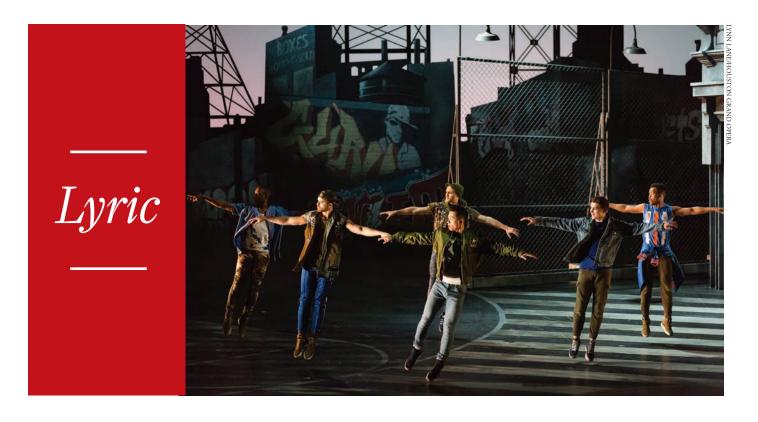
On February 2, Lyric's distinguished series of vocal recitals will continue with Welsh bass-baritone Sir Bryn Terfel, at Lyric for the first time in 15 years — his only Chicago-area appearance of the season. Recitals have always been essential in Terfel's

career, winning him as many admirers as his operatic roles. "Many longtime Lyric operagoers have wonderful memories of Bryn's thrilling portrayals of Figaro, Don Giovanni, Falstaff, and Sweeney Todd, among others," notes Freud, "and will jump at the opportunity to hear his magnificently expressive voice here in recital."

Eleven operas, a special concert, a celebrity recital, and a spectacular Broadway musical – 2019/20 at Lyric is sure to be a season to sing about!

Creators



ARTHUR LAURENTS

(*Librettist*) was for more than half a century one of America's most distinguished figures in the arts. He moved in the theater between writing to directing, while also scoring great successes

as a Hollywood screenwriter. Laurents began his career writing for radio, prior to the production of his first Broadway play, Home of the Brave (1945). Other plays included A Clearing in the Woods (1957) and Invitation to a March (1960). Laurents's association with composer/lyricist Stephen Sondheim includes, in addition to West Side Story, the musicals Gypsy (book), Anyone Can Whistle (direction, book), and Do I Hear a Waltz? (book). He also directed several other Broadway musicals, including I Can Get It for You Wholesale in 1962, La Cage aux Folles in 1983 (for which he won a Tony Award), the 2008 revival of Gypsy, and the 2009 bilingual revival of West Side Story. Among his screenwriting credits are Rope (for Alfred Hitchcock), Anastasia, Bonjour Tristesse, The Way We Were, and The Turning Point. He wrote two memoirs, Original Story by Arthur Laurents and The Rest of the Story. He died in 2011.



LEONARD BERNSTEIN

(Composer) transformed the way Americans and people everywhere hear and appreciate music. Bernstein's successes as a composer ranged from Broadway (West Side Story, On the Town,

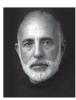
Wonderful Town, Candide) to major concert works, such as his three symphonies subtitled Jeremiah (1944), The Age of Anxiety (1949), and Kaddish (1963) - and Serenade for violin, strings and percussion (1954); Chichester Psalms (1965); Mass: A Theater Piece for Singers, Players and Dancers (1971); Songfest (1977); Concerto for Orchestra: Jubilee Games (1989); and Arias and Barcarolles (1988). Bernstein also composed two operas, Trouble in Tahiti (1952) and A Quiet Place (1983), and three ballets, Fancy Free (1944), Facsimile (1946), and Dybbuk (1975). He received an Oscar nomination for the score of On the Waterfront (1954). Bernstein conducted the world's greatest orchestras for almost half a century. He enjoyed special relationships with the New York Philharmonic (music director, 1958-69, thereafter permanent laureate conductor), the Israel Philharmonic, and the Vienna Philharmonic. Among Bernstein's many honors were the American Academy of Arts and Letters' Gold Medal, a Kennedy Center Honor, 11 Emmy Awards, a special Tony Award, a Lifetime Achievement Grammy Award, and the Japan Arts Association's Praemium Imperiale. Bernstein died in 1990.



STEPHEN SONDHEIM

(Lyricist) wrote the music and lyrics for A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, Anyone Can Whistle, Company, Follies, A Little Night Music, Sweeny Todd, The Frogs, Pacific

Overtures, Merrily We Roll Along, Sunday in the Park with George, Into the Woods, Assassins, Passion, and Road Show, as well as lyrics for West Side Story, Gypsy, Do I Hear a Waltz?, and additional lyrics for Candide. Anthologies of his work as composer and lyricist include Side by Side by Sondheim, Marry Me a Little, You're Gonna Love Tomorrow, Putting It Together, and Moving On. He composed film scores for Stavisky and Reds, and songs for Dick Tracy (Academy Award). Sondheim has won six Tony Awards for best score for a musical, and eight of his shows have won the New York Drama Critics Circle Award. Sunday in the Park with George received the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1985. Sondheim was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Letters in 1983. In 1990 he was the first Visiting Professor of Contemporary Theatre at Oxford University. He has received a Kennedy Center Honor and the Praemium Imperiale, Japan's highest honor, for a lifetime of artistic achievement.



JEROME ROBBINS* (Original Director and Choreographer) began his career as a dancer, winning particular praise as a soloist at Ballet Theatre (later known as American Ballet Theatre). Once he ended his

performing career, he achieved world renown as a choreographer of ballets, as well as for directing and choreographing in theater, movies, and television. His Broadway shows included On the Town, Billion Dollar Baby, High Button Shoes, West Side Story, The King and I, Gypsy, Peter Pan, Miss Liberty, Call Me Madam, and Fiddler on the Roof. His last Broadway production, Jerome Robbins' Broadway (1989), won six Tony Awards, including best musical and best director. Among Robbins's more than 60 ballets are Fancy Free, Afternoon of a Faun, The Concert, Dances At a Gathering, Other Dances, Glass Pieces, and Ives, Songs, which are in the repertories of New York City Ballet and other major companies worldwide. Robbins received two Academy Awards, four Tony Awards, five Donaldson Awards, an Emmy Award, the Screen Directors' Guild Award, and the New York Drama Critics Circle Award. He was a 1981 Kennedy Center Honors recipient and was awarded the French Chevalier dans l'Ordre National de la Legion d'Honneur. Robbins died in 1998.

Principals



COREY COTT* (Tony), a graduate of Carnegie Mellon School of Drama, received critical acclaim on Broadway for his performance in the Tony Awardwinning musical Bandstand. He made his Broadway debut as

Jack Kelly in Disney's Newsies and played the role for two years, followed by the revival of Gigi starring opposite Vanessa Hudgens. On television, he appeared opposite Christina Ricci in the Amazon series Z: The Beginning of Everything and costarred alongside Hattie Morahan in the BBC/PBS miniseries My Mother and Other Strangers. He can also be seen in a recurring role on The Good Fight (CBS All Access). Other credits include The Interestings (Amazon pilot), Madam Secretary, Public Morals, Law and Order: SVU, and recently completed filming a role in the new Fox pilot, Filthy Rich. A native of Chagrin Falls, Ohio, Cott previously starred in Francesca Zambello's staging of West Side Story in Concert with the National Symphony Orchestra at The Kennedy Center, conducted by Steven Reineke. He recently made his Carnegie Hall debut singing with the New York Pops.



MIKAELA BENNETT* (*Maria*) is a graduate of The Juilliard School and is celebrated as a singer and actress for her work on stage and in the concert hall. In 2019 she was honored with a Lincoln Center Award for

Emerging Artists. On stage, she made her professional debut starring as Penelope/ The Golden Apple at City Center Encores! She originated the role of Norma/Renascence in Dick Scanlan and Carmel Dean's new musical in New York City, and at the Prototype Festival she originated the title role/Acquanetta in a new opera composed by Michael Gordon. In the concert hall she has made her debuts with some of the world's leading orchestras, including the John Wilson Orchestra (as Maria/West Side Story, concert performance at the BBC Proms), the New York Philharmonic under Leonard Slatkin, the Philadelphia Orchestra under Yannick Nézet-Séguin, and both the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra and Los Angeles Philharmonic under Michael Tilson Thomas. She has also appeared as a soloist at the Kennedy Center and Carnegie Hall.

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AMANDA CASTRO* (Anita) has previously appeared in West Side Story as both Anita (Atlanta Opera, Glimmerglass Festival) and Consuelo (Lyric Opera of Kansas City, Houston Grand Opera). Castro has performed

widely in America and also abroad (London, Germany, South Africa). A California Institute of the Arts alumna, she was a principal dancer of the renowned Brooklyn-based company Urban Bush Women for four years. In the Run the Night competition at New York's Highline Ballroom, she won in 2016 and placed second in 2017 with Soles of Duende, her all-female percussive trio. Other New York credits include a recently completed year-long creative residency with Soles of Duende at Dixon Place Theatre; assisting choreographer Nick Kenkel at BC Beat; working as a model and movement specialist in New York Fashion Week; and dancing at Radio City Music Hall for the Ellie Awards. Castro was dance captain at Geva Theater (Rochester, New York) for In the Heights. Choreography credits include the American Dance Awards, several works for Urban Bush Women, and multiple set pieces for Northeast competition studios.



BRETT THIELE* (Riff) has appeared in multiple Broadway productions including Escape to Margaritaville, Miss Saigon, and Spiderman: Turn Off the Dark. A native of New Orleans, Thiele has appeared off-Broad-

way in *Clueless, The Musical* at the New Group. Regionally, he has appeared as Tulsa/*Gypsy* at the Maltz Jupiter Theatre, *The First Wives Club* at the Oriental Theatre in Chicago, *Follies* at the Repertory Theatre of St. Louis, and as Dakin/*The History Boys* at the Uptown Players in Dallas. His previous *West Side Story* performances include Riff with the St. Petersburg Opera Company and Action at the Asolo Theatre in Florida.



MANUEL STARK SANTOS (Bernardo) previously played this role at Ogunquit Playhouse. He has also portrayed Chino at New York's Palace Theatre and Riff at Carnegie Hall. Santos has appeared on Broadway as

Kassim/Aladdin (subsequently on the production's first national tour), Bonfils/Gigi, and S. Uperman/On the Town. In New York he has also been seen at the Public LAB (Venice: A New Musical), City Center Encores! (Do I Hear a Waltz, Little Me, Applause, Irma La Douce, The Most Happy Fella), Paper Mill Playhouse (Paul San Marco/A Chorus Line), New York Music Theater Festival (Rio), Houston's Theater Under the Stars (Disney's When You Wish), Atlanta's Alliance Theatre (world premiere of Bull Durham), and Pittsburgh Civic Light Opera (Ren/Footloose). He was also seen in 14 episodes of the NBC television series Smash.



ADAM SONIAK* (Action, uls Riff) comes to Lyric following the national tour of the American-premiere production of Andrew Lloyd Webber's Love Never Dies. No stranger to West Side Story, he has played

Riff at Casa Mañana and the Westchester Broadway Theatre, as well as in major cities across Europe with the international touring company. Regionally, he has appeared at Paper Mill Playhouse (*The Sound of Music*) Walnut Street Theatre (*Saturday Night Fever*), and Riverside Theatre (*Hello, Dolly!*). To honor this production, Soniak has made a donation to the Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights.

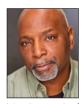

JAMES LOWE (Conductor) debuted at Lyric in 2012/13 leading Oklahoma!. On Broadway he was music director and conductor of the recent revival of Les Misérables and the revival of Anything Goes (Grammy nomi-

nation), starring Sutton Foster. Lowe made his Broadway debut conducting Gypsy, starring Patti LuPone. He led the first national tour of The Light in the Piazza, and was music director and conductor for the touring National Theatre production of My Fair Lady. Operatic engagements this season include La bohème (Houston Grand Opera), Jeanine Tesori's The Lion, The Unicorn, and Me (Washington), Show Boat (Glimmerglass Festival), and Rachel Portman's The Little Prince (Utah Opera). Lowe has also appeared at the San Francisco, Tulsa, New York City, and Wolf Trap opera companies. His close relationship with Houston Grand Opera includes productions of works of Mozart, Bizet, Copland, Sondheim, Portman, and Heggie. He debuted in Europe with Candide (Toulouse, subsequently Bordeaux). Lowe has also led the Houston Symphony, Memphis Symphony, Jacksonville Symphony, and American Composers Orchestra. Zambello has worked at more than 50 major opera houses and theaters in America and internationally, from Houston Grand Opera and the Metropolitan Opera to La Scala, the Opéra National de Paris, the Bolshoi, the Bavarian State Opera, Covent Garden, and Opera Australia. She is a Chevalier des Arts et des Lettres and has received two French Grand Prix des Critiques, three Olivier Awards, two Evening Standard Awards, the Golden Mask from Russia, the Russian Medal for Service to Culture and the San Francisco Opera Medal for San Francisco Opera's highest award for artistic excellence. PETER J. DAVISON (Set Designer) earned critical praise at Lyric for Porgy and Bess (2014/15, 2008/09) and Show Boat (2011/12). The British designer's productions with prestigious companies throughout

MARK GREY (Sound Designer)'s association with Lyric has encompassed seven productions since 2007-08, most recently My Fair Lady (2016/17), The King and I and The Merry Widow (both 2015/16), and Carousel (2014-

15). Grey made history as the first sound designer of the New York Philharmonic (2002) and the Metropolitan Opera (five productions since 2015, most recently Iolanta/Bluebeard's Castle). For more than two decades, professional sound design relationships have led Grey to premiere works by such artists and organizations as John Adams, Steve Reich, Philip Glass, Peter Eötvos, Terry Riley, Boosey & Hawkes Music Publishers, and many others. Productions include St. Matthew Passion (Berlin Philharmonic/Simon Rattle/Peter Sellars at the Park Avenue Armory, New York, 2015). He designed and toured extensively with Kronos Quartet for nearly 15 years and is also a longtime collaborator of composer John Adams. As a composer, Grey has recently undertaken commissions for the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra and the Los Angeles Philharmonic. His opera Frankenstein premiered at the Théâtre Royal de la Monnaie (Brussels) on June 14, 2016.



MICHAEL BLACK (Chorus Master) has been chorus master at Lyric since the 2013/14 season. Chorus master from 2001 to 2013 at Opera Australia in Sydney, Black prepared the OA chorus for more than 90 operas

and many concert works. He has served in this capacity for such distinguished organizations as the Edinburgh International Festival, Opera Holland Park (London), and, in Australia, the Sydney Symphony Orchestra (including Rachmaninoff's The Bells, led by Vladimir Ashkenazy), the Philharmonia Choir, Motet Choir, and Cantillation chamber choir. Black has also worked with the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra in Australia with Sir Andrew Davis. His recent activities include preparing the Damnation of Faust chorus, which continued his association with Grant Park Music Festival, where he has worked for two seasons. As one of Australia's most prominent vocal accompanists, Black has regularly performed for broadcasts and recordings (he has been heard numerous times in Australian Broadcast Corporation programs). He has served as chorus master on four continents, and his work has been recorded and/or aired on ABC, BBC, PBS, and for many HD productions in movie theaters as well as on television. Michael Black is the Howard A. Stotler Chorus Master Endowed Chair.

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JULIO MONGE* (Choreographer) recently revived the original choreography of West Side Story at Houston Grand Opera, the Glimmerglass Festival, Pittsburgh Ballet, and the Sydney Harbour outdoor stage for Opera Australia

(associate director). He has been performing for more than 30 years on stage, film and television. On Broadway he has performed in Jerome Robbins' Broadway, On Your Feet, Man of La Mancha, Lincoln Center's Twelfth Night, Chronicle of a Death Foretold, Fosse, and Paul Simon's The Capeman. Choreography credits include The Somewhere Project, celebrating Carnegie Hall's 125th anniversary; Tony Kushner's translation of Mother Courage and her Children, starring Meryl Streep, and the musical Radiant Baby, both directed by George C. Wolfe; The Threepenny Opera, starring Betty Buckley, at Williamstown Theater Festival; José Rivera's premiere of References to Salvador Dali Make Me Hot, starring Rosie Pérez; and the revival of Pablo Cabrera's La Verdadera Historia de Pedro Navaja in San Juan, Puerto Rico. Directing credits include Hedwig and the Angry Inch (also producer and translator) at Puerto Rico's Gay and Lesbian Theater Festival (Best Production Award, 2010). Monge is a collaborator and consultant on Steven Spielberg's upcoming film version of West Side Story.



SARAH HATTEN (Wigmaster and Makeup Designer), who has held this position at Lyric since 2011/12, has worked in a wide repertoire at Des Moines Metro Opera and Michigan Opera Theatre, as well as Columbus

Opera, Toledo Opera, the Cabrillo Music Festival, and the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. She has also worked at the Glimmerglass Festival and the major opera companies of Los Angeles, Omaha, Cleveland, Sarasota, and Central City, as well as Wisconsin's American Players Theatre and, in Los Angeles, the Pantages Theatre and the Geffen Playhouse. Hatten earned a B.A. in music at Simpson College. Sarah Hatten is the Marlys Beider Wigmaster and Makeup Designer Endowed Chair.



ERIC SEAN FOGEL (Associate Director) was last at Lyric with Show Boat as associate choreographer in 2012. This season his work can be seen in Porgy and Bess (Seattle Opera), Romeo and Juliet (Shakespeare Theatre

Company), The Marriage of Figaro (San Diego Opera), The Lion, The Unicorn, and Me (Kennedy Center), Florencia en el Amazonas and The Pearl Fishers (both at Houston Grand Opera). Fogel is currently on staff at the Glimmerglass Festival as head of stage movement and choreography. He will choreograph Show Boat and The Ghosts of Versailles for the 2019 season. Next fall Fogel will return to the Metropolitan Opera as an assistant

stage director. He has created new productions for Atlantic Theatre II, Opéra Bordeaux, Chicago Opera Theater, Hawaii Opera Theatre, Lyric Opera of Kansas City, LA Opera, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Opera Philadelphia, Théâtre du Capitole (Toulouse), Theater St. Gallen, XSBN (China), and Washington National Opera at the Kennedy Center.



JORDAN LEE BRAUN (Assistant Director) has been with Lyric since the 2015/2016 season (An American Dream, La traviata, La bohème, Il trovatore, Jesus Christ Superstar, The Pearl Fishers, Rigoletto, Charlie Parker's Yardbird,

and more). Braun frequently works with young artists through Lyric's Ryan Opera Center, directs student matinees for Atlanta Opera and Opera Colorado, and collaborates with DePaul University's Opera Department. She has directed *Rigoletto* at Toledo Opera and Opera Carolina, and has also assistant-directed for the Colorado and Atlanta companies, as well for Charlottesville Opera. Braun has worked in stage management at Wolf Trap Opera, Washington National Opera, Opera Omaha, Fort Worth Opera, and others.



NICK SANDYS (Fight Director) has supervised the stage fights for more than 40 productions at Lyric, most recently *Il trovatore* this season. A certified teacher and fight director with The Society of American Fight

Directors, Sandys has created fight choreography throughout the Chicago area, including for the Goodman (more than 25 productions), Steppenwolf, Lookingglass, Northlight, Victory Gardens, Remy Bumppo, Timeline, First Folio, Shattered Globe, Light Opera Works, Silk Road Rising, and The Theatre School at DePaul University (adjunct since 1995). His work outside Chicago includes the Metropolitan Opera, Portland Opera, and Dallas Opera, as well as numerous major theater companies nationwide. Sandys's fight choreography has received four Joseph Jefferson Award nominations, winning in 2008 (Requiem for a Heavyweight). He is also producing artistic director of Remy Bumppo Theatre Company. As an actor he has appeared with numerous Chicago theaters, receiving another nine Jeff nominations for acting and two for directing. He holds a 2011 Meier Foundation Award for Artistic Achievement and was a 2018 APA Audie Award Finalist.



KATE DEVORE* (Diction Coach), one of Chicago's most successful voice coaches and speech pathologists, is the founder and master trainer of Total Voice, Inc., which provides voice, speech, and presence coaching.

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Hot and Cool: The Creation of West Side Story

The 1958 Tony Awards included five Best Musical nominees. Three of those shows seldom, if ever, performed today - were memorable chiefly as vehicles for major stars: Tony Randall (Oh, Captain!), Lena Horne (Jamaica), and Gwen Verdon (New Girl in Town). The fourth show, The Music Man, which ultimately won the award, was an affectionate depiction of turn-of-thecentury Iowa that turned journeyman actor Robert Preston into a Broadway headliner. The fifth nominee was the "odd show out." To begin with, the principals were unknowns, not stars. It was a gritty show, colored by both the cruelty and the ecstasy of young people living and loving in a vibrant but dangerous urban setting. It also had a tragic ending, unprecedented for a Broadway musical. But it abounded with awe-inspiring talent, and everything about it communicated the excitement of the new.

This was West Side Story.

The show's many miracles began with

its creators, as formidable a team as any musical-theater production has ever seen. Leonard Bernstein (music), Arthur Laurents (book), and Jerome Robbins (director/ choreographer) had all triumphed on Broadway before. Stephen Sondheim (lyrics), then only 25 years old, was working on his first Broadway show, although he was certainly as acutely intelligent and stupendously gifted as his three colleagues. But however savvy each man may have been, in this case they were all very much feeling their way into a show unlike anything seen previously on Broadway.

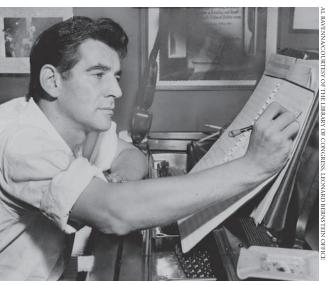
On January 6, 1949, Bernstein wrote that Robbins had called him with "a noble idea": a contemporary Romeo and Juliet, refashioned as a conflict between Jews and Irish Catholics, "set in slums at the coincidence of Easter-Passover celebrations" on New York's Lower East Side (the title, in fact, was originally East Side Story). Robbins proposed Laurents as the right person to create the adaptation. But those three were among the busiest people on the American performing-arts scene, and the project was eventually shelved. In 1955, however, when Bernstein encountered Laurents in California, it came up again. The idea of a Jewish/Catholic Romeo and Juliet was now abandoned, in favor of an "American" gang (the Jets) vs. a Puerto Rican one (the Sharks). And so to work, with Sondheim now on board as the fourth collaborator.

Known as a playwright, director, and screenwriter, Laurents later described his West Side Story dialogue as "my translation of adolescent street talk into theater: it may sound real, but it isn't."2 In his brilliantly constructed libretto, several situations parallel Shakespeare's play:

• the Capulet/Montague ball becomes the "Dance at the Gym," where Tony and Maria meet;

- the equivalent of Shakespeare's "balcony scene" happens on a fire escape;
- although the lovers don't have a modern-day Friar Laurence to marry them, they do exchange vows on their own in the bridal shop where Maria works;
- a confrontation between the gangs results in their leaders' deaths: Riff (counterpart of Shakespeare's Mercutio) is killed by Bernardo (Tybalt), Maria's brother, and the enraged Tony (Romeo) who'd formerly been a member of the Jets kills Bernardo.

Laurents's ending departs from Shakespeare, which must have stunned 1950s audiences, accustomed in musicals to seeing conflicts happily resolved in time for the finale. Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet both commit suicide, but in *West Side Story* only Tony dies – shot by Chino, Bernardo's vengeful friend. The gang members are bitterly castigated by Maria, who accuses them all of Tony's murder. It's clear that their feud has now ended, but one wonders whether the young but disillusioned and emotionally scarred Maria will ever find love again.

The show progresses seamlessly from one scene to the next, with five extended dance sequences beautifully integrated into the drama. The dances begin with the young

men of the Prologue; with both arms and one leg outstretched as they strut down a New York street, they present one of the most recognizable images from any American musical. Created by Robbins (with the great show dancer Peter Gennaro as his uncredited co-choreographer), the original West Side Story choreography remains enthralling today, whether the Jets, the Sharks, and their girlfriends mambo-ing in an explosion of incendiary sexual electricity in "The Dance at the Gym"; Anita and her cheeky sidekicks in "America" (Bernstein, inspired by a particular Mexican folk dance, marked the music "tempo di huapango"); Riff urging his anxious Jet buddies to stay "Cool," in the show's most overtly jazzy number; and the touching ballet that leads into "Somewhere," midway in Act Two.

Bernstein's universally beloved score is arguably the greatest of his career. Early in the show, breathless alterations between hushed eagerness and all-out exuberance support Tony's premonition that "something's coming." Later, his joyous repetitions of his new love's name ("Maria") illuminate that name through the melodic line's eloquent use of the tritone. The Latin rhythms of Maria's "I Feel Pretty" sparkle, the ideal expression of her irresistible girlishness. The audience follows her star-crossed romance with Tony from the delicate, luminous cha-cha in the orchestra accompanying their first dance to the combination of impetuosity and tenderness in "Tonight," the quiet serenity of "One Hand, One

Heart," and the lovers' desperate, anguished phrases preceding the "Somewhere" ballet (the song itself, assigned in the original production to Consuelo, one of the Shark girls, is sung by Maria in Lyric's production.)

In the wild flamboyance of "America" we're captivated by the worldly, deliciously sarcastic Anita. Later, after Bernardo – who had been her fiancé – is killed by Tony, Anita berates Maria in the scathing "A Boy Like That" (to which Maria responds with sweet restraint in "I Have a Love"). Bernardo has no song of his own, but Riff dominates both the "Jets' Song" and "Cool." Together those numbers depict a fearless, charismatic troublemaker who gives new meaning to the adjective "streetwise." Midway in Act Two, the Jets – now without their murdered leader – provide the show's only episode of genuine hilarity in "Gee, Officer Krupke," their endearingly obnoxious justification of their own delinquency.

Bernstein had no objection to opera (he'd written a successful one, *Trouble in Tahiti*, just five years earlier), but a purely operatic *West Side Story* wasn't his aim, as he admitted when summing up the challenge facing him and his colleagues:

Chief problem: to tread the fine line between opera and Broadway, between realism and poetry, ballet and "just dancing," abstract and representational. Avoid being "messagy." The line is there, but it's very fine, and sometimes takes a lot of peering around to discern it.³

Although he did impose certain rhythmically complicated musical structures on a musically and vocally inexperienced cast (as in the electrifying quintet reprise of "Tonight"), Bernstein took pains to create a score that would be technically manageable and wouldn't tempt his singers into overtly operatic expression.

The casting process proved challenging. There was none of Broadway musicals' usual "dancing chorus" and "singing chorus"; everyone needed to act the dialogue convincingly, master the music and lyrics, and dance the extraordinary new stylistic fusion developed by Robbins. Grover Dale, who created the role of Snowboy, noted years later that "one of the most amazing things about the choreography is that it starts in naturalism and within seconds naturalism is transformed into a form of ballet and jazz. Making that transition, finding dancers who are capable of doing that, was one of the main casting elements as that show got produced."4

The rehearsal period was immensely exciting, if also unnerving, thanks to Robbins, an almost terrifyingly strict taskmaster in preparing the dances. He also wanted tension

and competition between Jets and Sharks, insisting not only that they avoid socializing together, but that they rehearse in different rooms! For Chita Rivera, a stunning dancer and the first Anita, it wasn't just Robbins's work on the show that made a lifelong impact on her – it was Bernstein's as well:

> It was great to walk into that rehearsal hall and hear that music. When I heard the cha-cha, I couldn't stop crying, it was so perfect for the scene, perfect for the book, and beautiful to listen to. My heart was totally involved with his music. He gave me the library that's in my head of knowing what a wonderful score is all about. Smart and musical and complicated and passionate scores, where the lyrics work beautifully with the music and you can leave the theater humming a beautiful melody.5

As for Stephen Sondheim, West Side Story is hardly a favorite among his own works. Five decades after the premiere, he declared with typical frankness: "There aren't any fantastic rhymes in West Side Story. They're almost all day and may, go and show. It would have been betraying the characters if they'd rhymed too well. 'I Feel Pretty' still bothers me. It's just too elegant for a girl like Maria to sing. I mean, "It's alarming how charming I feel"? That wouldn't be unwelcome in Noël Coward's living room."6

But Sondheim has never denied the show's uniqueness, noting that "its importance lies in its theatricality. It was a more sophisticated blending of music, dance, song, and dialogue than anything that had been done before."7

The creators didn't start out anticipating success; they were simply eager to do something genuinely bold, regardless of the outcome. Having no idea what to expect, everyone involved in the show was consequently astounded on opening night of the Washington tryout, when the audience literally screamed with enthusiasm during the curtain calls. In New York, where West Side Story premiered on September 26, 1957, the most astute critics thoroughly understood the show - especially The New York Times's Brooks Atkinson, who hailed the creative team:

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Pooling imagination and virtuosity, they have written a profoundly moving show that is as ugly as the city jungles and also pathetic, tender and forgiving. [Tony and Maria's] balcony scene on the firescape [sic] of a dreary tenement is tender and affecting. From that moment on, West Side Story is an incandescent piece of work that finds off bits of beauty amid the rubbish of the streets. Everything contributes to the total impression of wildness, ecstasy and anguish.8

West Side Story is one of the world's most honored and most often performed shows, and exciting productions like Francesca Zambello's – produced at Glimmerglass, Houston, now at Lyric – continue to renew its hold on audiences. Much ink has been spilled in explaining why it remains a seminal work of American musical theater. Among today's commentators on the show, Jamie Bernstein, the composer's daughter, has been particularly eloquent and deserves the last word:

[Bernstein] was somebody who was always trying to make the world a better place. The best vehicle was through his own music. West Side Story was his most successful attempt to use his music to explore the difficulties we all live within our world and to use music as almost a kind of healing process. West Side Story is about hatred, intolerance, fear of strangers arriving in your neighborhood – these are issues as urgent for us today as they were back then. My father's music really gives us a language with which to explore these issues and find ways to resolve them.⁹

Roger Pines, dramaturg of Lyric Opera of Chicago, has appeared annually on the Metropolitan Opera broadcasts' "Opera Quiz" for the past 13 years. He contributes regularly to opera-related publications and recording companies internationally. He has recently presented lectures at the inaugural Teatro Nuovo bel canto opera festival (New York), the Newberry Library, and DePaul University's Opera Department.

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A Message from the Director

"Two households, both alike in dignity..." Thus begins Shakespeare's tale of Romeo and Juliet, in which we see "ancient grudge break to new mutiny." When Arthur Laurents first conceived a modern, musical version of the play, he imagined a rivalry between Catholic and Jewish communities on the Lower East Side; only later did he and his collaborators move the story uptown, pitting a gang of "native" New Yorkers against those more recently arrived.

Although America is a country of immigrants, we continue to struggle with issues around immigration and migration, which makes West Side Story an important tale for today. (As Sondheim's lyric neatly put it, "Nobody knows in America / Puerto Rico's in America.") The creators of

West Side Story, although well-intentioned, didn't get everything right; later critics have pointed out lapses into stereotype. (This is true in so many "period pieces" that we put on the stage today, and as always, I look forward to the opportunity to engage in a dialogue about some of the thorny issues presented by the piece, both with my colleagues and with our audience members.)

Lapses aside, by putting the tragic cost of two warring tribes center stage, the authors made an important statement about the human tendency to organize ourselves into factions. Especially with the rise of social media, we have all become more tribal in our outlook. I think the story of two warring "tribes" challenges all of us to look at how we define and mar-

ginalize "the other." Perhaps we find it easy to engage with people of different cultural backgrounds. But what about differences in education? Religion? Resources? Politics?

Leonard Bernstein scrawled "an out and out plea for racial tolerance" across the first page of his copy of Romeo and Juliet. As we approach this piece in 2019, in the midst of a world immigration and refugee crisis, I hope we can make that plea reverberate in a new way. I also hope we can challenge ourselves to think broadly about ways in which we arbitrarily dismiss the experiences and opinions of those who are not like us.

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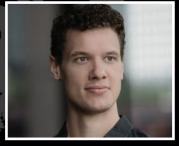


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Facilities and Services

- Please turn off or silence all electronic and personal devices and refrain from using any device with a glowing screen at any time during the performance.

Patrons with Disabilities:

The Lyric Opera House is accessible to persons with physical disabilities, with elevator service to all floors except the Opera Club. The Ardis Krainik Theatre contains seating that is accessible to persons in wheelchairs, as well as seats with removable armrests. The Lyric Opera House has automatic door-openers on exterior doors, and accessible drinking fountains and public telephones. A TTY phone is available in the Box Office for

Restroom facilities for female patrons with disabilities are located on all levels except the Opera Club. For male patrons, these facilities are located on all levels except the Opera Club and the sixth floor.

Assistive listening devices for persons desiring amplification are available at no cost at the Main Floor coat check. A valid driver's license or state identification is required as a security deposit.

Large print and Braille programs may be available at the Main Floor coat check.
