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

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A new era at Lyric Opera of Chicago:

An interview with new Music Director Enrique Mazzola



Enrique Mazzola became Music Director of Lyric Opera of Chicago as of July 1, 2021. The Spanish-born, Italian-trained conductor is only the third person in Lyric's 67-year history to serve in this capacity, following the tenures of Sir Andrew Davis and the late Bruno Bartoletti.

Mazzola first came to the attention of Lyric audiences when he led performances of Donizetti's *Lucia di Lammermoor* during the 2016/17 season and *Bellini's I puritani* in 2017/18. The bel canto specialist also launched the company's Early Verdi Series in 2019/20 with *Luisa Miller*. Mazzola's first opera as Lyric Music Director is Verdi's *Macbeth*, brought to the stage in a new production by Director Sir David McVicar. This season, Mazzola also conducts Donizetti's *The Elixir of Love* and the company and Chicago premiere of Missy Mazzoli's *Proving Up*.

Mazzola was born into a musical family and studied violin and piano from an early age. Following his family's move from his native Barcelona to Milan, he sang in the children's chorus of La Scala, where his father worked as a répétiteur. Mazzola credits his early immersion in the daily life of Italy's foremost opera house for instilling in him a deep love of opera, and for making him un uomo di teatro: "a man of the theater." He holds diplomas in composition and orchestral conducting from the Giuseppe Verdi Conservatory, and credits legendary La Scala maestros Claudio Abbado and Carlos Kleiber for inspiring him to pursue a career on the podium. Mazzola is now one of the most sought-after operatic and symphonic conductors of his generation, and has held major posts in France, Germany, Italy, and now, Chicago.

HOW DOES IT FEEL TO BE AN OFFICIAL MEMBER OF THE LYRIC OPERA FAMILY?

There are a very big number of different emotions. I am so proud to be at Lyric Opera. I am happy to be engaged with Chicago and this great opera house. Actually, I felt I was already actively engaged with Lyric and the city last season when, because the ongoing pandemic prevented us from giving live performances, I created four different filmed streaming programs. Each was dedicated to a different artistic force: our Orchestra,

our Chorus, The Patrick G. and Shirley W. Ryan Opera Center, and, so as not to lose an important part of our cycle of early Verdi operas, a web series focused on the dozen musical numbers of *Attila*.

YOUR PREDECESSOR, SIR ANDREW DAVIS, LEFT YOU WITH AN OPERA ORCHESTRA THAT IS, BY GENERAL CONSENT, PLAYING AT THE TOP OF ITS GAME. TELL US SOMETHING ABOUT THE RELATIONSHIP YOU'VE ALREADY BUILT WITH THE ORCHESTRA, AND ALSO, FOR THAT MATTER, THE INCOMPARABLE LYRIC OPERA CHORUS.

I have a fantastic group of great colleagues, both in the Orchestra and Chorus, which makes me very happy! In a way, the difference between me and other conductors is that I have a very specific way of searching for the musical truth that lies within the score. The Orchestra's

players know that my approach is very true and honest, but also direct, and not subject to the "old rules" of [interpreting the Italian repertoire]. I am a revolutionary in the sense that I am committed to bringing out what's really in the score, not just merely recreating [spurious] performance practices that have come down to us from recordings and throughout the last century. The Chorus knows I am very demanding about searching out and communicating the meaning of the words, especially in Verdi; in one rehearsal, I spent an hour and a half focusing solely on the text. This is not what an "antiquetradition conductor" does! Sometimes, traditions that arose later in the nineteenth century and into the verismo era can contaminate a "pure" reading of Italian Romantic opera.

PARIS OPERA IN 1865, WILL BE GIVEN NOTE-COMPLETE, WITH THE EXCEPTION OF THE BALLET MUSIC. HOW DO YOU ASSESS THE OPERA FROM A MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC STANDPOINT?

Opera-goers sometimes forget that a big part of the 1865 *Macbeth* is actually early Verdi. The revised music accounts for maybe 40 percent of the opera, but the remaining 60 percent is from the 1847 original. Two years separate the composition of the original version of Macbeth and Luisa Miller (1849), and those were crucial years in Verdi's stylistic development. The 1847 Macbeth sounds more modern and challenging than Luisa Miller. I'm sure the spectral, fearful atmosphere of Macbeth fired Verdi's deepest imagination. Already in 1847 he was using compositional devices, such as chromatic scales, that were more advanced than anything else he was writing during that period. Listen, for example, to how he uses the piccolo and clarinet in their lowest registers to create a dark and scary effect. Verdi's orchestral writing speaks directly to the audience, whether it's conveying horror, terror, victory, or vengeance.

MACBETH HAS BEEN CALLED A "CONDUCTOR'S OPERA," AS OPPOSED TO A "SINGERS' OPERA." DO YOU SUBSCRIBE TO THAT VIEW?

No. I don't think there are "conductor's operas." I'm absolutely convinced that the role of the conductor is a role inside a larger artistic team, and that's the way I work with my singers, orchestra, and chorus, as well as collaborating in close partnership with the director and the production team.

IS LYRIC'S NEW MACBETH YOUR FIRST COLLABORATION WITH SIR DAVID MCVICAR?

Yes. We have met many times over dinner at Glyndebourne, but have never worked together before now. He has prepared a fantastic *Macbeth* for us; the familiar story is seen from different angles. There is no better director than David [who was born in Glasgow, Scotland] to recreate the strange, sometimes terrifying Scottish world of Shakespeare, as filtered through the genius of Verdi.

HAVE YOU FOUND A PERMANENT RESIDENCE YET IN CHICAGO, OR ARE YOU STILL LIVING OUT OF SUITCASES?

No more suitcases, please! One of the first things I did after being named Music Director was make Chicago my new home—my new city. When I was Artistic and Music Director of the Orchestre national d'Île-de-France in Paris, I moved there immediately. I'm convinced that being a music director is not only about the artistic role, but also about absorbing all the influences, feelings, and information that come from the city in which one is based. I feel as if Chicago is already my home. The Lyric Opera House is a half-hour walk from where I live. I've started taking CTA buses. I'm very European, and Europeans always use public transportation.

I like living in the city. I also like that the Lyric Opera House is open to everybody. We at Lyric Opera want to offer our art to everyone. This is really my big cultural mission.

Synopsis

Act one

Scene 1. King Duncan's generals, Macbeth and Banquo, encounter witches who prophesize that Macbeth will be made Thane of Cawdor and King of Scotland, while Banquo will be the father of kings. Moments after the witches have vanished, messengers from Duncan arrive and proclaim that Macbeth has been named Thane of Cawdor. The generals are mystified at the swift fulfillment of the first part of the prophecy. After the men have departed, the witches agree to reassemble at the first storm to fulfill the second prophecy and to deliver an oracle to Macbeth, who will, they know, consult them again.

Scene 2. Lady Macbeth reads a letter from her husband describing the eerie events. She wishes for her husband's swift return so that she may aid him in ascending to the throne. A servant informs Lady Macbeth that the King, accompanied by Macbeth, will arrive that night. She then invokes the spirits of darkness to help her accomplish Duncan's murder.

Macbeth joins his wife, and she reveals her plan which must be carried out before the King's departure in the morning. Alone, Macbeth contemplates the deed that lays before him. With a bloody dagger in his hand, he encounters Lady Macbeth and tells her of Duncan's death. She urges him to smear the sleeping guards with blood so they will be accused of the murder. He refuses, and she takes the dagger and fulfills the task herself.

Macduff and Banquo come to awaken the king to continue his journey. When the murder is discovered, Macbeth and his wife feign horror as they join Duncan's followers in their cries for vengeance.

Act two

Scene 1. Malcolm, Duncan's son, has fled to England, and his flight confirms the court's suspicion that he is guilty of his father's death. This leaves the throne vacant for Macbeth. He recalls the prophecy that Banquo's sons shall be kings and confides in Lady Macbeth his plan to murder Banquo and his only son. When Macbeth has gone, Lady Macbeth easily reconciles herself for the necessity of more bloodshed and anticipates the thrill of power when all threats to Macbeth's position have been removed.

Scene 2. Accompanied by his son during the evening, Banquo is filled with foreboding. He is killed by Macbeth's assassins, but his son escapes.

Scene 3. Lady Macbeth and her husband greet their guests at a banquet. One of the assassins privately reports to Macbeth the outcome of their mission. Macbeth is about to take his place at the table when Banquo's ghost appears – to the guilty man alone. Macbeth's horror amazes his guests and casts a pall on the festivities. Lady Macbeth vainly attempts to restore a light-hearted mood.

Intermission

Act three

Scene 1. Macbeth forces the witches to produce apparitions that pronounce the triple oracle: "Beware Macduff;" "None of woman born shall harm Macbeth;" "Macbeth will never be vanquished till Birnam Wood moves against him." Lady Macbeth joins Macbeth, and together they plot to destroy their enemies.

Act four

Scene 1. Scottish refugees lament the sad fate of their country since Duncan's death. Macduff mourns his wife and children, murdered by Macbeth's assassins. Malcolm arrives with English soldiers as reinforcements to march against Macbeth. He orders the soldiers to cut boughs from the trees of nearby Birnam Wood to conceal their numbers. The army sets out.

Scene 2. A doctor and lady in waiting keep a vigil to see if their queen, whose reason has been affected by the recent bloody events, will again walk in her sleep. She soon does; in her mind, she relives the crimes she has committed.

Scene 3. Macbeth is fearless at the prospect of battling his enemies. He regrets only that his chosen course of action has deprived him of the honor, respect, and love that might otherwise have brightened his declining years. His soldiers enter to inform him that Birnam Wood is moving toward the church. He meets death at the hands of Macduff, who was torn prematurely from a dying mother and hence does not disprove the oracle that "none of woman born shall harm Macbeth." The victorious army hails Malcolm as king.

CRAIG COLCLOUGH | MACBETH
Lyric debut

Bass-baritone Craig Colclough made his Metropolitan Opera debut in the title role of *Macbeth*, and returns to its roster later this

season to sing Monterone/Rigoletto. During the summer of 2021, he debuted with the Tiroler Festspiele Erl as Alberich/Das Rheingold. Other 2021/22 season engagements include performances of Bach's St. Matthew Passion with his home company, Los Angeles Opera, which named him a 2021 recipient of the Eva and Marc Stern Artist Award, and Alberich with Nashville Opera. Future seasons include returns to the Metropolitan Opera and Tiroler Festspiele Erl, and his debut with the Grand Théâtre de Genève. During the COVID-19-impacted 2020/21 season, Colclough's original schedule was to include appearances with Washington National Opera (debut) and the LA Philharmonic in the role of Henry Kissinger/Nixon in China, Kurwenal/Tristan und Isolde with Opera Vlaanderen, and Amonasro/Aida with LA Opera.



SONDRA RADVANOVSKY | LADY MACBETH

Previously at Lyric: Eight roles since 2002/03, most recently Lisa/The Queen of Spades, The Three Queens (both 2019/20).

Widely regarded as one of today's premier Verdi bel canto interpreters, the world-renowned American soprano made history as the first soprano to perform Donizetti's "Three Queens" at the Metropolitan Opera in a single season. Among her other recent successes have been Aida (new production, Opéra National de Paris) and Rusalka (Canadian Opera Company, in Sir David McVicar's production). Radvanovsky is much acclaimed in Europe, from the Royal Opera House to La Scala, the major Spanish houses, and the Zurich Opera House. She has also appeared with the major orchestras of Chicago, Boston, San Francisco, and Munich, as well as the Verbier Festival Orchestra. She can be seen on DVD in Alfano's Cyrano de Bergerac and has starred in three performances for the "Met: Live in HD Series," for which she has also served as host three times. Radvanovsky can be heard on CD in a solo recital of Verdi arias and in Verdi opera scenes with Dmitri Hvorostovsky. She makes her role debut as Lady Macbeth in this Lyric production.



JOSHUA GUERRERO | MACDUFF Lyric debut

The fast-rising American tenor has appeared with many prominent companies internationally, including France (Gabriele Adorno/

Simon Boccanegra, Opéra National de Bordeaux); Germany (Des Grieux/Manon Lescaut, Oper Frankfurt); Britain (Pinkerton/ Madama Butterfly, Glyndebourne Festival Opera); Spain (Nemorino/L'elisir d'amore, Seville's Teatro de la Maestranza); and Venezuela (Rodolfo/*La bohème* with the Simón Bolívar Symphony Orchestra in Caracas, with which he has also sung Beethoven's Symphony No. 9, conducted by Gustavo Dudamel). Among his major successes in America are Rodolfo (San Diego), Edgardo/ Lucia di Lammermoor (Miami), and tenor soloist/Haydn's The Creation (Los Angeles Philharmonic). Guerrero's portrayal of Count Almaviva/Corigliano's The Ghosts of Versailles can be heard on CD in a recording that was honored with two Grammy awards. A native of Las Vegas, Nevada, the tenor is an alumnus of UCLA and the young-artist programs of the Santa Fe Opera and LA Opera. In 2014, Guerrero won second prize at the prestigious Operalia competition.



CHRISTIAN VAN HORN | BANQUO

Previously at Lyric: 17 roles since 2004/2005, most recently Count Walter/*Luisa Miller* (2019/20), Méphistophélès/*Faust* (2017/18).

This season the American bass-baritone, a Ryan Opera Center alumnus and winner of the 2018 Richard Tucker Award, sings Don Giovanni and Méphistophélès/Faust with Opéra National de Paris, and Figaro and Nick Shadow/The Rake's Progress at the Metropolitan Opera. Van Horn was recently acclaimed at the Met for his role debut as Boito's Mefistofele, and as Colline/La bohème and Publio/La clemenza di Tito. He has also recently reprised his portrayals of Narbal/Les Troyens (Paris) and Escamillo/Carmen (Munich) and returned to San Francisco Opera as Zoroastro/Orlando (his 15th role at SFO). His diverse repertoire also includes the Four Villains/Les contes d'Hoffmann (SFO), Gessler/Guillaume Tell (Amsterdam), and Zaccaria/Nabucco (Seattle). Successes in contemporary opera include Thomas Adès's The Exterminating Angel (Met), Marco Tutino's La Ciociara (SFO), Tan Dun's Tea (Santa Fe), David Carlson's Anna Karenina (Miami, St. Louis), and Joseph Summer's The Tempest (Boston). Concert engagements include the major orchestras of Berlin, Cleveland, Chicago, New York, and San Francisco. Christian Van Horn is sponsored by Exclusive Sponsor Lois B. Siegel.



MATTHEW VICKERS | MALCOLM Lyric debut

Recent engagements for the tenor include his debut with the Maggio Musicale Fiorentino as Principe Dimitri/Risurrezione and returns

Additional highlights include performances of Rodolfo/*La bohème* (Dayton), tenor soloist/Beethoven's *Symphony No. 9* (Carmel Symphony), Pinkerton/*Madama Butterfly* (Virginia, Memphis, Shreveport), Don José/*Carmen* (Macerata Festival), Canio/*Pagliacci* (Savannah Music Festival), and a concert appearance with Sarasota Opera. In the 2021/22 season, Vickers sings Rodolfo with Virginia Opera and Foresto/*Attila in* Sarasota, and will sing his first Maurizio/*Adriana Lecouvreur* with Baltimore Concert Opera.

The third-year Ryan Opera Center soprano recently performed in the "Sunday in the Park with Lyric's Rising Stars" concert, and returns to the Lyric stage as First Lady/ The Magic Flute later this season. Elsewhere she has previously portrayed Fiordiligi/Così fan tutte, First Lady/The Magic Flute, Sandman/Hansel and Gretel, Romilda/Xerxes, the Milliner/Der Rosenkavalier, and Cio-Cio-San/Madama Butterfly. As part of San Francisco Opera's Merola Opera Program, she sang selections from Thaïs and I vespri siciliani in concert, and covered the title role in Ariadne auf Naxos as a Santa Fe Opera Apprentice Artist in 2018. She is the recipient of a 2019 Sara Tucker Study Grant from the Richard Tucker Music Foundation, and has triumphed in numerous competitions, including Houston Grand Opera's Eleanor McCollum Competition. A third-year member of the Ryan Opera Center, the bass recently appeared in "Sunday in the Park with Lyric's Rising Stars" and "Sole e Amore," and sings Second Armored Man/The Magic Flute and Sciarrone/Tosca at Lyric this season. Reed was recently seen at Wolf Trap Opera as Friar Laurence/Romeo and Juliet. A former Adler Fellow at San Francisco Opera, his highlights there include King of Egypt/Aida, Speaker/The Magic Flute, and Dr. Grenvil/ La traviata, among other roles. His repertory also encompasses Sarastro/The Magic Flute, Don Magnifico/La Cenerentola, and Don Basilio/The Barber of Seville. He has performed with Grammy award-winning symphony orchestras and some of the world's most esteemed conductors, among them Nicola Luisotti and Donald Runnicles. Reed is an alumnus of the Curtis Institute of Music and the Merola Opera Program. Anthony Reed is sponsored by J.Thomas Hurvis.

Italian soprano Maria Novella Malfatti is a second-year Ryan Opera Center member and recently appeared in "Sunday in the Park with Lyric's Rising Stars." In 2020 she debuted at the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam as Azema/ Semiramide and sang at Dutch National Opera in Weill's Rise and Fall of the City of Mahagonny. Previously, she performed in Mahagonny for the Festival d'Aix-en-Provence. DENIS VÉLEZ | THIRD APPARITION
Lyric debut

The soprano, a second-year Ryan Opera Center member from Puebla, Mexico, sang in "Sunday in the Park with Lyric's Rising Stars," and will be

heard later this season as Giannetta/The Elixir of Love and Papagena/ The Magic Flute. She was a national winner of the Metropolitan Opera's 2020 Eric and Dominique Laffont Competition. In Mexico's most important platform for rising talent, the National Singing Contest Carlo Morelli, her performance earned her the First Prize, the French Opera award, and the Francisco Araiza Special award. ENRIQUE MAZZOLA | CONDUCTOR

The Italian conductor, Lyric's Music Director,

is renowned as an expert interpreter and champion of bel canto opera and a specialist in French repertoire and early Verdi. He is Principal Guest Conductor at the Deutsche Oper Berlin and served as Artistic and Music Director of the Orchestre national d'Île-de-France (2012-2019). During the 2020/21 season, Mazzola appeared in Lyric's virtual programs "Sole e Amore," "The Sonata Sessions," "Attila: Highlights in Concert," and "Attila: Breaking Down the Score," and returned to London in March for muchacclaimed concerts with the London Philharmonic Orchestra. Symphonic guest work has also included the Orchestre National du Capitole de Toulouse, Philharmonia Orchestra, Vienna Symphony, London Philharmonic, and Brussels Philharmonic. Mazzola has conducted bel canto works for Metropolitan Opera, La Scala, Paris's Théâtre des Champs-Élysées, and the major houses of Florence, Strasbourg, Berlin, Zurich, Moscow, and Tokyo, in addition to a historic Meyerbeer cycle for Deutsche Oper Berlin. Past major European festivals have included Glyndebourne (including DVD releases of The Barber of Seville and Poliuto), new productions in 2019 for Bregenz (Rigoletto) and Salzburg (Orphée aux Enfers), Pesaro (Rossini Opera Festival), Venice, and Aix-en-Provence. SIR DAVID McVICAR | DIRECTOR

Previously at Lyric: Nine productions since 2001/02, most recently *Elektra* (2018/19, 2012/13), *Il trovatore* (2018/19, 2014/15, 2006/07).

The renowned Scottish director's productions are seen annually in major houses worldwide, with recent highlights including new productions of Adriana Lecouvreur, Roberto Devereux (both at the Metropolitan Opera, the latter a company premiere), Médée (Geneva's Grand Théâtre), and I masnadieri (La Scala). McVicar has created nine new productions for the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden and seven for the Met, where he will direct a new Don Carlos this season. He has also directed at La Scala (Les Troyens), Opera Australia (Don Giovanni, The Marriage of Figaro), the Vienna Staatsoper (Tristan und Isolde, Falstaff), English National Opera, Glyndebourne, Scottish Opera, Opera North, Paris's Théâtre des Champs-Élysées, the Salzburg Festival, the Mariinsky Theatre, and many other major companies. Among his awards is the 2011 Grand Prix de la Musique du Syndicat de la Critique. In 2012 he received a knighthood and was made a Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres.



JOHN MACFARLANE | SET DESIGNER

Previously at Lyric: Four productions since 2001/02, most recently *The Queen of Spades* (2019/20); *Elektra* (2018/19, 2012/13).

Among the Scottish designer's extensive opera credits internationally are Tosca (Metropolitan Opera), Benvenuto Cellini (Geneva), Hansel and Gretel (Welsh National Opera, Met), The Queen of Spades (WNO), War and Peace and La clemenza di Tito (Paris), Agrippina (Brussels), Boris Godunov (Amsterdam), Euryanthe (Glyndebourne), A Midsummer Night's Dream (Cologne), Les Troyens (English National Opera), Don Giovanni (Brussels, San Francisco), Idomeneo (Vienna), and Maria Stuarda (Met). Macfarlane made his Royal Ballet debut in 1985 with Giselle. He has since returned regularly to the Royal Opera House, designing Glen Tetley's La Ronde and Liam Scarlett's Asphodel Meadows, Sweet Violets, The Age of Anxiety, Frankenstein, and Swan Lake for the Royal Ballet and Erwartung/Bluebeard's Castle, Peter Grimes, The Magic Flute, Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk, Gianni Schicchi, and L'heure espagnole for the Royal Opera. His many other ballet designs include The Nutcracker, Le Baiser de la fée and Cinderella for Birmingham Royal Ballet. Macfarlane's painting and printmaking are widely exhibited across the U.K. and Europe. He was created a Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres in 2006.



DAVID FINN | LIGHTING DESIGNER

Previously at Lyric: Three productions since 2013/14, most recently *Les Troyens* (2016/17); *Tannhäuser* (2014/15).

Since 1997 the renowned designer has worked increasingly in opera, with productions including The Rake's Progress (Scottish Opera); Parsifal (Metropolitan Opera); The Marriage of Figaro (Sydney); Tannhäuser (Berlin); Ariane et Barbe-bleue (Paris); Ariadne auf Naxos (Salzburg); Otello (Brussels); Falstaff (Florence); Boris Godunov, Lucio Silla, Così fan tutte, Don Giovanni and Le nozze di Figaro (Amsterdam); Das Rheingold, Les Contes d'Hoffmann and Orfeo (Stuttgart); Alcina, Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk and Faust (San Francisco); and the Ring cycle (Toronto). Finn's extensive work at London's Royal Opera House includes, for the Royal Ballet, Giselle, Other Dances (both with Jennifer Tipton), Sweet Violets (Knight of Illumination Award), Frankenstein, Symphonic Dances and Swan Lake; and for the Royal Opera, Bluebeard's Castle/Erwartung, Peter Grimes, The Flying Dutchman, and Tannhäuser. Finn was resident lighting designer for Mikhail Baryshnikov's White Oak Dance Project from 1993 to 2000. Film work includes Martin Scorsese's The Age of Innocence, and onstage, ZED (Tokyo) and Michael Jackson ONE (Las Vegas) for Cirque du Soleil. David Finn is supported by the

MORITZ JUNGE | COSTUME DESIGNER

The German set and costume designer made his debut co-designing the acclaimed world



A cloistered Macbeth

For an opera so steeped in foggy highlands that its source material is known to superstitious theater insiders as "the Scottish play," Lyric Opera of Chicago tapped two proud Scotsmen, Sir David McVicar and John Macfarlane, to create a new production to spark the 2021/22 season—Lyric's return to live mainstage performance after 18 months dark. The duo's vision for the opera keeps the action in Scotland, but changes the historical time period and restricts the setting to a ruined Presbyterian chapel.

Director McVicar and set designer Macfarlane have not situated Lyric's new *Macbeth* in the eleventh century of the historical Macbeth, who had little to do with Shakespeare's tragedy, anyway. Nor did they choose the early seventeenth century, which was when Shakespeare's play premiered near the start of the reign of James I, who ascended to the unified throne of England and Scotland in middle age after reigning in Scotland from toddlerhood. Instead, McVicar and Macfarlane have placed the production in the midnineteenth century—a Scotland that is contemporaneous with Verdi's revised *Macbeth*. Lyric is performing the 1865 score, called the "Paris revision" because of its debut at the Théâtre Lyrique in Paris (the original version premiered in 1847).

The Presbyterian chapel serves as the setting for all scenes in this production; even the witches' Sabbath heretically takes place within the sacred walls. The banquet scene, during which Macbeth and Lady Macbeth invite the noble thanes of Scotland to extol Macbeth's reign, shows the church as a community space. At the close of the opera, it serves as the last redoubt for Macbeth against the advancing army camouflaged with the boughs of Birnam Wood.

A church is a place of good and evil, legend and myth, and a place to impart lore and morality. Centering this production in the chapel signals moral instability, as the witches practice dark arts within its walls. Macbeth strides into a roiling, vibrating tension created by these dichotomies, and drawn downward by his political ambition—with his wife egging him on—makes his (im)moral choices. All suffer the consequences.

The chapel space is modified throughout the production to indicate scene changes or reorient the audience's

perspective. In the opera's opening, the prophesying witches sit in the pews, facing the house. For Act II, the church is turned around so that viewers face the altar to hear the Macbeths plotting Banquo's murder. The furniture is reset for a banquet, then placed in disarray for the witches' Sabbath, then cleared away entirely. A wall is removed for the final act, which allows the audience to see Malcolm's advancing army on the horizon amid a fiery backdrop, hand-painted by Macfarlane. Macfarlane, an accomplished artist who regularly shows in U.K. galleries, painted the backdrops and the front curtain.

The single-location conceit of the staging means shunning many typical Macbeth trappings. There are no lavish castles, witchy caves, or desperate heaths. For the feast scene, the meager decorations added to the space—smallish portraits, a few pennants—situate the celebration as more of a dreary church tea than a magnificent meal. Instead of the standard alternation between gloomy, sinister milieus and royal grandeur, the aesthetic is uniformly stark.

The chapel setting, a conduit with the divine, amplifies the story's prominent supernatural elements, particularly in Act III when apparitions foretell Macbeth's future and witches sing and dance around a cauldron that rises out of the floor. The women of the community return to practice witchcraft, diabolically distorting the sacredness of the

space. The pews become coffins and the dead, buried in a crypt beneath the church, rise. Corpses spring to life, holding candles as in Scottish poet Robert Burns's "Tam O' Shanter:" "Coffins stood round like open presses, / That shaw'd the dead in their last dresses; / And by some devilish cantraip sleight / Each in its cauld hand held a light." (Cantraip means "a witch's trick or mischievous device"). Playing out in the dim, claustrophobic, holy space, where the world outside the walls is completely dark, horror develops in the suggestibility of the audience's imagination.

In keeping with the prevailing Romantic-era view, Verdi's use of the supernatural, like Burns's, isn't merely spooky; Verdi's witches sing jaunty, major-key music that emphasizes the comical

and grotesque. McVicar says the nineteenth-century setting matches Verdi's treatment of the phantasmagorical Scottish tradition, right down to a similar gathering at the climax of "Tam O' Shanter," which also takes place in a ruined church.

McVicar believes the Macbeths' lust for power stems from their lack of children. In Shakespeare's play, Lady Macbeth laments, "I have given suck, and know / How tender 'tis to love the babe

that milks me," but the play provides no other evidence of this child. Children are prominently featured in this new production's Walpurgisnacht-like display. One of the apparitions is a large, bloody, newborn child puppet. In one sequence, Lady Macbeth receives a Christmas gift from a brood of children: a tiny, baby-sized coffin. Birth, of course, pivots the warning that "No man that's born of woman / Shall e'er have power upon thee;" Macbeth mistakenly believes no man can overthrow him, but in fact, Macduff, born by Cesarean section, or, as he puts it, "From his mother's womb / Untimely ripp'd," ultimately fells him.

Two Lady Macbeth scenes demonstrate the versatility of this production's setting. When the church transforms into a celebratory space for the banquet scene, Lady Macbeth sings a drinking song—a *brindisi*—"Si colmi il calice" ("Fill the chalice"), that is an earlier iteration of Violetta's famous brindisi "Libiamo, ne' lieti calici" from Verdi's *La traviata*. Connecting to the toast by way of red wine and red blood, Lady Macbeth sleepwalks through the empty church to sing "La macchia," an aria about her inability to clean blood off her hands, the "Out! damnèd spot" of Shakespeare's play. Here, the chapel is a space of confession and guilt.

The costumes in the production, designed by Moritz Junge, pertain to the era of Verdi's Paris revision. Macbeth appears in dress indebted to portraits of Prince Albert, Queen Victoria's consort at Balmoral, the British royal family's Scottish castle. Lady Macbeth wears layers of crinoline under lush, unadorned fabrics. Banquo's military outfit is akin to an American Civil War uniform. Macduff is in full Highland dress, as is King Duncan—wearing the Duncan clan's tartan pattern, of course. The chorus women in the Sabbath scene wear period undergarments such as shifts, corsets, and sarks.

The production also draws inspiration from memento mori photographs. In early photography, which aligns with the time in which this production is set, when a loved one passed away,

relatives would dress the body up, pose it, and take a picture as a symbol of remembrance. The macabre tradition resonates with the bodies left in Macbeth's wake; memories of the dead persist like the blood on Lady Macbeth's hands.

No matter what era Macbeth is set or performed in, it offers a lens for current events. At the time of its premiere, King James I believed himself a descendant from the line of the historical Banquo, so Shakespeare may have used the


prophecy that Banquo's heirs would rule as a form of royal flattery. When the Paris revision premiered in 1865, Abraham Lincoln had been assassinated less than a week earlier.


Shakespeare and Verdi paint Macbeth with mythic brushstrokes, inviting patrons to see a historical template in the mayhem wrought by Macbeth's ambition. "Macbeth's tragedy is our tragedy," McVicar says. Those hungry for power will always be with us, and some will inevitably turn to violence to acquire or sustain it, failing to recognize the mayhem is of their own making, as so happens with Macbeth in his last moments of introspection before the English forces reach him. Instead, he resorts to selfpity, seeing himself as a victim in a meaningless world, life as "...a tale / Told by an idiot, full of sound and fury / Signifying nothing."

Now, as audience members return to Lyric after a hiatus imposed by a modern-day plague, the company hopes the Scottish play portends a future in which successions are smooth and the tragedy stays onstage. Let the trees march onward.

Beyond the stage

EmpowerYouth!

Some years ago, in a landscape where many performing arts organizations were scaling back their educational and community engagement programs, Lyric took a bold step and increased its commitment to innovative learning, civic engagement, and of-our-time creative programming.

The 2021/22 season marks the fifth year of Lyric's *EmpowerYouth!: Igniting Creativity through the Arts* program in partnership with the Chicago Urban League—a program that encourages and guides Black Chicago high-school students in creating an original production to tell the story of their lives and how they deal with issues pertinent to them. Participants in the program work with professional artistic staff and program facilitators to learn how principles of performance, the written word, music, and dance can translate to their everyday lives.

During Lyric's virtual 2020/21 season—determined not to let the pandemic deter its creative work—*EmpowerYouth!* continued on Zoom with the same group of students that participated during the 2019/20 school year. Program librettist Kristiana Rae Colón worked to shape the script and libretto with words pulled from meaningful conversations, participant quotes, and journals from the *EmpowerYouth!* participants. She worked to transform what was on their minds, their immediate fears, and what they found inspiring during this difficult time into a cohesive libretto. Colón

drew out general themes—social justice, control, superpowers, more educational options for creativity—that culminated in a work called *Contagion*.

Contagion follows the future grads of Powerhouse Academy of the Performing and Visual Arts as they return to school after an extended summer break to discover that their school has changed. There's a new principal spreading the "contagion" of a rigid regime, and the students must use their creative and artistic talents, and a little magic, to melt the new leader's icy heart.

Once the libretto was set, Colón worked with composer and teaching artist Shawn Wallace to create music for the production, inspired by popular music that the participants liked. Osiris Khepara, the program's acting mentor, took time to allow the students space to play: "I wanted the students to have that freedom and really understand that this was theirs and only theirs." Eventually, once city COVID restrictions began to lift in the spring of 2020, small groups of the ensemble gathered to record their songs and film dance numbers at the Chicago Urban League. All of these elements—the libretto, music, choreography, and individual songs/raps/spoken words from the ensemble—came together in a final performance for friends and family in June.

And what did the 2020/21 *EmpowerYouth!* ensemble think of this year's experience? "Everyone welcomed me with open arms." "I finally came out of my shell and sang!" "It was so great to get out of my comfort zone." "I'll never forget this *EmpowerYouth!*



community." Some of the program's young artists viewed the virtual final presentation of *Contagion* from college, and one watched from a summer teaching program in Peru. Many of the ensemble's recent high-school graduates have received full-tuition scholarships to schools including Columbia College Chicago and Morehouse College.

EmpowerYouth! offers students a truly unique creative opportunity that helps inspire them to pursue the arts and find their own voice. Lyric's 2021/22 **EmpowerYouth!** ensemble begins work this fall at the Chicago Urban League with new stories that need to be told, new participants with new perspectives, and new opportunities for students to discover the power of the performing arts and how they can be harnessed as a powerful catalyst for change.

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

Dan Novak - Vice President & Director of The Patrick G. and Shirley W. Ryan Opera Center



WHAT IS YOUR ROLE AT LYRIC, AND HOW LONG HAVE YOU HELD THE POSITION?

I have the great privilege of serving as director of The Patrick G. and Shirley W. Ryan Opera Center, Lyric's artist-development program, a position I've held since 2013. The Ryan Opera Center's

mission is to identify and nurture the talents of some of the most promising operatic artists of the next generation.

WHAT LED YOU TO WORK AT LYRIC?

While pursuing a music education degree at Northwestern University, I developed an interest in arts administration. I was searching for internship opportunities in the winter quarter of my senior year and found one in the Development department here at Lyric, working with the Women's Board. I immediately felt a close connection with the people and the company. I went back to school, and, just before graduating, received a call from my internship supervisor with a job offer. That was June of 1989, and Lyric has been my only employer since.

In the Women's Board office my duties centered on the special events it hosted, including the Wine Auction and Opening Night & Opera Ball. That latter event involved working closely with the Ticket department, so it was a logical next step for me to move there as assistant ticket manager. Two years later I returned to Development as assistant director for Chapter activities, which gave me a chance to work with a wonderful group of Lyric supporters throughout the area, from northwest Indiana to southern Wisconsin. In March of 2000 I came to the Ryan Opera Center as manager, working closely with Richard Pearlman and Gianna Rolandi. This ultimately led to being named director of the program in April of 2013.

I feel incredibly blessed to have had amazing opportunities and experiences here over three decades—and especially to have met and worked with remarkably talented colleagues, volunteers, and other supporters, many of whom are dear and close friends.

WHAT'S A TYPICAL DAY LIKE FOR YOU?

Most days consist of a pretty wide variety of tasks—overseeing our Ensemble members' activities for the day (lessons, coachings, classes, rehearsals, and performances), working on short- and long-term future plans, sometimes hearing auditions, and so on. Our program is unique among most peers in that we're up and running nearly the entire year—it keeps all of us very well occupied! One of the most rewarding aspects of my job is that I get to collaborate regularly with just about every other Lyric department..

WHAT'S THE MOST CHALLENGING ASPECT OF YOUR JOB?

After working so closely with each artist in the Ryan Opera Center Ensemble for two or three years, it's really tough to say goodbye. We develop a real family bond. Happily, though, there are many future opportunities for our paths to cross, as I see them in performances elsewhere during my travels—and it's always a joy to have them return to perform here at Lyric, their artistic home.

WHAT KEEPS YOU COMMITTED TO THE WORK YOU DO?

There is nothing more gratifying than witnessing the growth and progress of our artists. Every time I watch someone who has great talent work really hard to develop it and then see that artist succeed when given an opportunity to share it with the world—like stepping in for an ailing colleague to perform a leading role in a Lyric mainstage production—I'm recommitted to furthering the program's work.

WHAT'S SOMETHING ABOUT YOUR JOB THAT PEOPLE MIGHT NOT KNOW?

I'm very fortunate to work closely with the Ryan Opera Center's very own Board of Directors, a remarkable group of people who are incredibly passionate and generous in their support of the program and the artists. Their enthusiasm and advocacy are extraordinary! Several Board members travel the world to see opera, and it's very meaningful for our artists to see a familiar face backstage to congratulate them. We've also organized a few Board trips to see alumni perform. In 2019 we went to the Met and saw former Ryan Opera Center artists appear on three consecutive nights—quite a testament to the program's achievements!

A FAVORITE LYRIC MOMENT?

It's really hard to name just one, so I'll mention the first. A few months after I started was Lyric's 35th Anniversary Season. The opening-night production was *Tosca* (which has since become a favorite opera!), and I was asked at the last minute to fill an empty seat on the main floor. When Giuseppe Giacomini, who was portraying Cavaradossi, sang his first-act aria, I was absolutely stunned—I had never heard anything like that in my life. And how fortunate I have been since then to have heard so many incredible voices in the Ardis Krainik Theatre.

BEYOND OPERA, WHAT ARE YOUR OTHER PASSIONS?

I'm an avid theatergoer. Prior to the pandemic, my husband and I traveled to Stratford, Ontario every summer for 20 years to attend its theater festival, seeing up to eight or nine plays in a week—and absolutely loving it! We can't wait to return next summer! I'm also a lover of food, be it a delicious taco from a street vendor to a multi-course fine-dining experience—and everything in between!
